

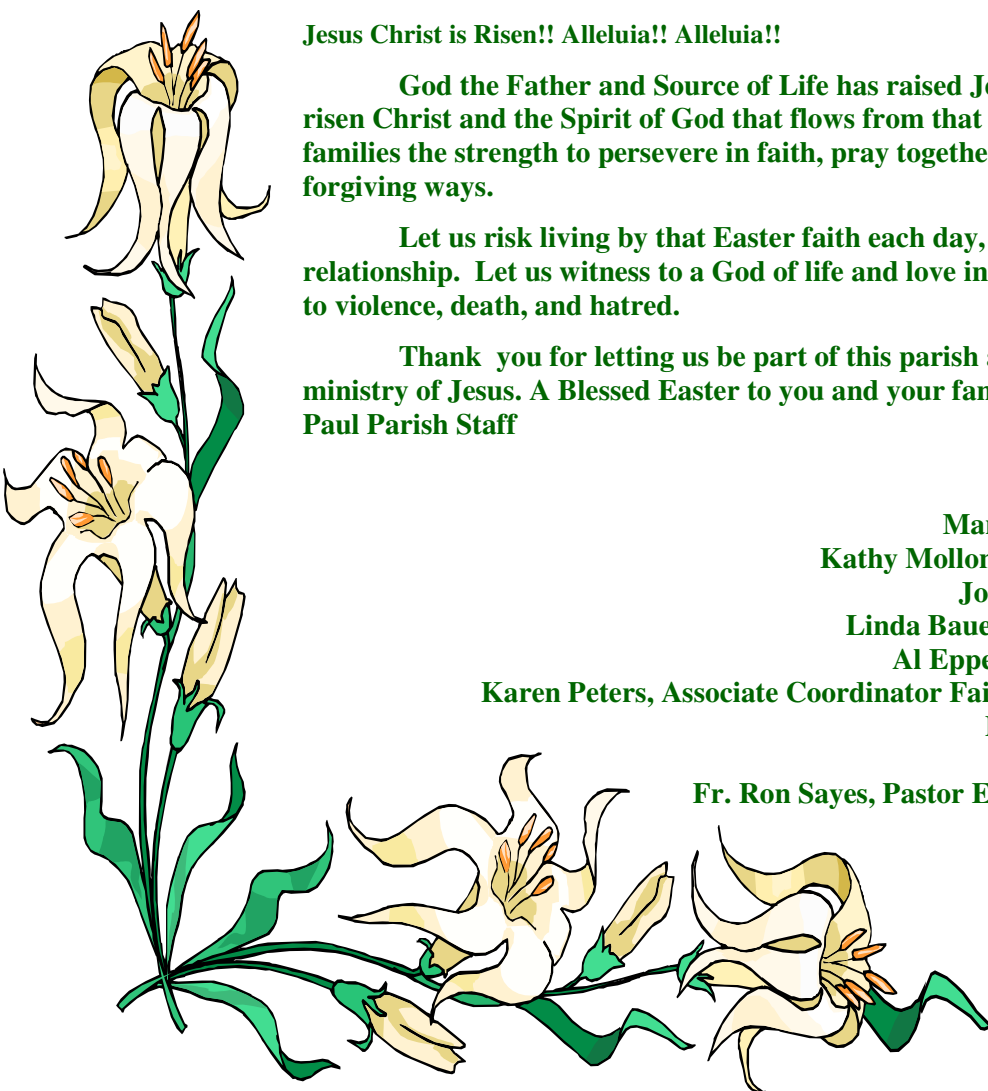
# Christ is Risen! Alleluia!

## Baptism Preparation

Here at SS. John and Paul Parish, the Sacrament of Baptism takes place during the weekend liturgies. Because Baptism is a welcome into the Church community, we feel that this can best be done in the context of Liturgy where the majority of our family gathers on a weekly basis.

Baptism preparation sessions **begin** 3 months before the actual Baptism. It consists of one interview in which the child is registered for the sacrament, an anointing of the child with the oil of Catechumen at any mass previous to the scheduled Baptism, and 2 or 3 preparation sessions for the parents. These sessions last 1 hour and are scheduled after the 11:30 a.m. mass on Sundays previous to the actual Baptism date. Parents are required to attend these sessions and sponsors are encouraged to come with them. There is one other requirement: the family must be registered in the parish for a minimum of three months prior to the Sacrament. This allows for proper preparation for the family.

Baptism take place monthly during our weekend liturgies with the times rotating from mass to mass depending on the month. You may begin preparation at any time either during your pregnancy or after the child has been born. Please remember that preparation should begin 2-3 months before your chosen date.

The dates about upcoming preparation dates and Baptisms can be requested by calling the parish office (586.781.9010) and asking for JoAnne.

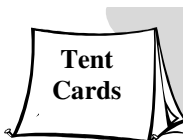

thinking brought in.

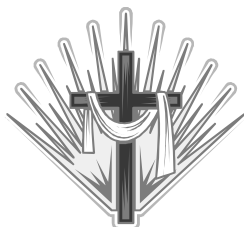
The Resurrection happened,

## astor’s Perspective

### \*Easter Season

Alleluia! The Lord is risen! We enter into the fifty days of Easter leading up to Pentecost. In many ways the archdiocese faces difficult times. The recently promulgated "Together in Faith" five year plan for the archdiocese involves the closing of some parishes and schools immediately and the potential merging and/or clustering of many others in the near future. We have all heard about the millions of dollars that have been loaned by the archdiocese to build and support the Pope John Paul II Cultural Center in Washington, D.C. One can see how some might be tempted toward disillusionment with the institutional end of the Church and its leaders.

But I hope that isn't the final response any of us would have here at this parish. I believe our worship, our religious education, our Christian service and outreach all make a difference in this world. I hope that we remain committed to making the mission and ministry of Jesus part of the living story of our own lives, the life of this parish community, and the life of the surrounding region.

The Catholic Services Appeal is the most important financial way that the Church in the Archdiocese of Detroit is able to continue its "living story of faith" on the widest scale: ministry to prisoners, refugees, homeless, women looking for alternatives to abortion, hospitalized Catholics, deaf Catholics, young adults at college campuses, supporting Catholic schools, religious education formation, helping divorced Catholics seek help with prior marriages, supporting Sacred Heart Seminary in its training of men for priesthood and lay men and women for ministry in the Church, specific ministries that help poorer parishes, and much more.

I don't know how to stress this strongly enough. **The CSA makes a huge and positive difference in the lives of thousands of people. You can be proud that you help make such ministry possible.** The Catholic Services Appeal money is pre-designated for certain ministries. The budget is pre-set and all money collected goes to fund those ministries or is returned to the parishes for their own use. No CSA money goes toward supporting the loan to the JPII Cultural Center. No CSA money has gone toward paying for the legal ramifications of priest abuse. No CSA money goes into an open-ended use

category. A yearly audit is done to ensure that monies collected for CSA are used for the designated ministries.

Before the end of April you will be receiving from me the usual CSA letter, pledge form and return envelope. Please do your best to contribute generously to the CSA. All monies over and above our parish target (we are still waiting for that target but I will list it in the letter to you) are returned to the parish for its own use, with no taxation. In other words, 100% of your CSA contribution helps the parish directly as well. It helps us reach the mandatory target (which we have to pay to the diocese no matter what) and then comes back to the parish for its own use, once that target is reached. This past year over \$70,000 has been returned to the parish for its own use, tax-free from the diocese, from CSA 2005.

Each of us is different in what we are able to contribute. Once again I am asking that people try to pledge/contribute at least \$300 to the CSA. Some can afford to do much more. Some cannot afford to do that much. Please be generous and do your best and help make this year's Catholic Services Appeal a success. Thank you.

### **\*The "Secret" Gospels, the Early Church, and What We Believe**

Over the next few weeks, space permitting, I want to share how the early Church came to decisions about what gospel books were to be authoritative and how such decisions shape our understanding of Jesus. What prompts this is the soon to be released movie the *DaVinci Code*, the recently released document "The Gospel of Judas," and another book trumpeted by U.S. News and World Report as telling an alternative story of what Jesus wanted to accomplish (a kingly dynasty on earth). What are we to make of all this interest in secret gospels, alternative histories of Jesus and the like? First of all, let's use some common sense. Works of fiction can pretend to be "historically-based" but they are works of fiction. The *Da Vinci Code*, for example, uses (and is allowed to use since it is simply a work of fiction) many fabricated and historically false and inaccurate "facts." Historical documents (like the *Gospel of Judas*) are to be interpreted in their

historical context. History writing (like the aforementioned book saying that Jesus wanted to start an earthly dynasty) are to be judged by the standards of good historical research.

Beneath all of the hype is a common thread that the "official Church" somehow re-invented Jesus for its own purposes and suppressed alternative ways of understanding Jesus. How did the gospel books get chosen? Why didn't the Church include in its official canon (the list of books to be read at worship) gospels like the gospel of Peter, the gospel of Thomas, the gospel of Philip, the gospel of Judas, the gospel of Mary Magdalene and the like? Why did some Christian groups use such non-official gospels and what did they teach that so upset the mainstream Church? In the coming weeks I will take a look at these questions and try to give the best scholarly historical understanding we have at the present so that you have some context within which to judge the claims made by various authors.

May the God who sustains life and who raised Jesus from the dead give you and your families hope and courage this Easter season.

## Online Offertory

Did you know that SS. John & Paul has some parishioners who support the parish by using online banking? Every week we receive offertory checks that our parishioners have authorized their bank to send us. These offerings are treated just like it was dropped in the Sunday collection since an envelope number is printed on the check.

Electronic Sunday Offerings is another way to consistently support the parish automatically. Electronic Sunday Offerings (ESO) is a pre-authorized payment plan where parish members authorize monthly or bi-monthly deductions to be made from their checking or savings account to the parish's account.

If either of these opportunities to support the parish appeals to you, you can pick up an ESO form in the literature racks in back of church or set the church up for a weekly automatic donation on your personal computer using online banking. Thank you for considering one of these electronic ways to contribute to the parish.

## Meijer Community Rewards Update
