***Policy and Procedures on "Protecting God's Children"**

Nearly all the priests, pastoral ministers, and other lay personnel of the Archdiocese of Detroit and of each parish have been through the "Protecting God's Children" program. They have gone through a criminal background check as well. In addition, nearly all catechists and many other volunteers throughout the archdiocese who have unsupervised contact with minors have also gone through criminal background checks and most have attended the "Protecting God's Children" workshop.

But notice the language—"nearly all," "many" and "most". As a Church we have not reached the goal of 100% participation and we need to continue to make that happen. The basic policy is two-fold: 1) Allow a criminal background check to be done. 2) Attend a "Protecting God's Children" workshop which shows how to create

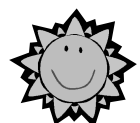

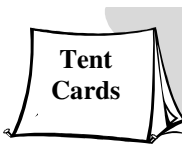

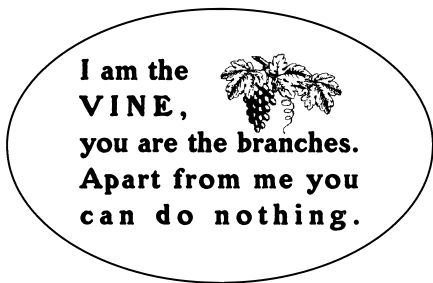
Without Jesus we can do nothing. How is your life different when you take this message seriously?

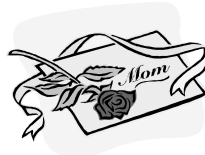


Precious Angel Blankets

safer environments for children and be aware of warning signs for abuse.

Here at SS. John and Paul I would like to see us get as close to that 100% compliance as possible. But where does one draw the line? The basic criterion is the potential for unsupervised contact with a minor. Certainly the parish staff, catechists, youth ministry workers and the like need to follow that policy (and we are). However, there are also many other situations that have that potential—training teens in the various areas of ministry, inviting youth to help with Christian service projects, working with children at social events such as the picnic, and on and on. As a result there is no clear way to draw a line and say “These people need to follow the policy and these don’t.”

As a result, I think it is best that we use the school model and simply encourage and expect all volunteers to at least have a criminal background check. School districts already have instituted such a policy for all their volunteers. I would like to see a similar policy for the parish. What would that mean in practice? In practice that would mean that it would become standard for anyone volunteering in the parish to get a copy of the archdiocesan and parish policies and sign a form saying they’ve received these and give us permission for a background check. Only two people would have access to do that check and be privy to any information—myself as pastor and our business manager, Mrs. Paula Klozik, who is in charge of the “Protecting God’s Children” compliance in our parish. And the only information that is pertinent to us is something to do with abuse of minors or which would affect a person’s ability to be in an unsupervised volunteer situation.

Every volunteer would also be invited to attend a “Protecting God’s Children” workshop within the year of first volunteering. Once those two things are done, then the person would be able to be to volunteer for any situation. Could someone who has not attended a workshop still be a volunteer for child and youth situations? We would have to think that through, but they would have to have at least signed off on the policy and background check.

But, to be honest, the workshop is not just for volunteers in parish situations. It is about creating safer environments for our children everywhere. I would think that nearly every parent, grandparent, aunt and uncle would want to attend at some time.

Could someone volunteer who doesn’t sign off on the background check? Yes, probably, but then I as pastor would have to figure out how we guarantee that they would never be in a church-sponsored setting of unsupervised contact with minors. That is something I want the parish council to address so that we can come up with a policy that is not burdensome to you as parish volunteers, but allows us to create a truly vigilant and safe environment for the children of the parish, no matter what activity they are part of. If you have ideas, let me know. But at this point, I think the school model is a good one.

***The “Secret” Gospels, the Early Church, and What We Believe (Final Thoughts)**

Where does all this exploration of secret gospels and Gnostic groups leave us who believe in the Church’s understanding of Jesus? Squarely in the realm of reasoned and reasonable faith. In the end, one can choose if you want a Gnostic vision of Jesus and history, or an alternative version that differs from the mainstream. However, the Christian Church puts faith in a vision rooted in Paul, in the four authoritative gospels, and in the earliest Church’s sorting out of what was authentic and inauthentic in the understanding of Jesus.

But we do not avoid the hard historical questions. In fact, Christianity is remarkable for its willingness to ask any and every question of Jesus and put it to the test. Unlike Islam, where one does not question the literal veracity of every detail of the Qur’an, Christians are invited to let science, history, sociology, and psychology, and so forth all test the reasonableness of our faith. It stands up quite well, thank you. The mainstream Christian vision is a powerful, deeply whole and healing vision of life. Has it been misused to bad ends at times? Absolutely, and that is why we Catholics are not to be “fideists”: believe simply

because I or someone else is telling you. But in the end we do place our faith in the Christian message, I would hope, as it has been handed on to us by apostolic authority. We take the risk of faith and then test out the life it leads us to. It has been so from the beginning. May it remain so. It has led to a very human Church, filled with sinners and saints, but a Church that always finds its way back to the message, ministry and vision of Jesus handed on to us from the beginning by the early communities.

What about the book and soon to be released movie the *DaVinci Code*? Just because someone alters known historical facts and calls his work ‘historical’, doesn’t make it so. There’s a whole library of books out there debunking the historical mistakes and fantasy creations of the book. My experience is that those who want to ignore the historical record will do so, no matter what you say. On the other hand, if you want some information to use in your discussion with such people, the U.S. Catholic Conference of Bishops has put up a website called “Jesus DeCoded” (www.jesusdecoded.com) which you might find helpful.

For myself, I prefer to keep reminding people that it is a work of fiction, pure and simple. No, it is not historically credible that there was a bloodline of Jesus (and Mary Magdalene) that passed secretly through the centuries through the French Merovingians. No, there is no ancient Priory of Sion of the sort depicted in the book. No, Leonardo da Vinci was not trying to symbolize a missing child in the painting of the Last Supper by not depicting the chalice—he is basing the scene on the gospel of John where there is no mention of the passing of a cup. Nor is the feminine-looking figure at his side an image of Mary Magdalene. [It is an image of the “beloved disciple” mentioned in the gospel of John who was identified with the evangelist John. It was not unusual for Leonardo to paint young men in such a way.] No, Opus Dei is not a group that has 7 foot tall albino initiates who are willing to kill if necessary. Though I don’t agree with some of what Opus Dei does, I would never accuse them of that! It is a

respected Catholic group whose founder, Josemaria Escriva, was fairly recently canonized. And on and on.

But, please remember. It is a work of fiction, pure and simple. Therefore the author is free to invent whatever he wants. The point is to try to tell a good story. I don't know what to say to people who are getting all riled up. Yes, I wish it depicted the Church in a more positive light. Yes, I think it is important to tell, especially younger adults, that this is not historically credible. But just as there are the fictional “Ben Hur” stories out there, which are not to be taken as showing historical accuracy but give some good images of the Church to people, there are movies and books that don't. If someone tells you that they truly believe the storyline of the movie, challenge them to do some research, using credible sources, and have a discussion with them after that.
