The ministry is scheduled to begin in the fall. This will allow time to recruit and prepare sacristans. A View Into the Beyond

Mt. 28:16-20



The only view the prisoner had of the outside world was through a small window high up on the wall. He hated his confinement and despised the miserable view he had of the world—the only one he believed in.

As time passed this little window became his friend. It offered only tiny bits of life—a wisp of cloud, a free-flying bird, a passing plane, a falling leaf, a raindrop, a snowflake. He soon realized that this was not such a bad thing. He began to concentrate on the particular and to make much of a little thing. He was amazed at how much life there could be in such a small sample.

At times the view from the window was shallow and opaque. The world seemed to end at the window. But at other times the window opened onto a blue and empty sky giving access to infinity. Awakening within him were transcendent longings he never knew were there. This little window helped him to appreciate the things of heaven as well as the things of earth.

Eventually he was released and now everything was available to him. But there was a tendency to see everything in general and nothing in particular. In the cell he had a transcendent dimension to his life. The 'beyond' was very important to him. He grew to love the feeling that there was another world greater by far than this one. Now he feared that this feeling, this longing, overcome by triviality, would go back to sleep, or die of neglect.

Faith provides us with a window into the beyond. It gives us access to another world—the world of the eternal, the world of God. But our preoccupation with the here-and-now can deprive us of 'the beyond', can draw a curtain over the window. We may bury our transcendent longings, but we can't extinguish them.

When we allow ourselves to get disconnected from God, an enormous loss takes place. There is a desire to possess something beyond the world we know, beyond ourselves, even beyond our power of imagining. This is where our faith comes in.

God is Father, Son and Holy Spirit. In God the Father we have a Father who cares deeply about us. In Jesus we have a Brother who died for us, and who as promised to remain with us always. And in the Holy Spirit, we have a Comforter, who guides us to the kingdom of eternity.

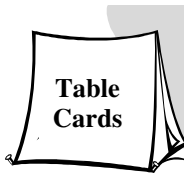

Blood Drive: Top Ten Excuses

SS. John & Paul will sponsor an American Red Cross Blood Drive on Thursday, June 22 from 1:00 – 7:00 PM. Below you will find a list of the top ten excuses people often use to avoid donating blood. Hopefully after reading this information, you will be encouraged to give. Remember, only 5% of the eligible population become blood donors. Please prayerfully consider this life saving act! Next week, look for the top ten reasons to donate. A sign up sheet is posted in the hallway to the Activities Center.

1. **I don't like needles / I am scared of needles / I am afraid to give blood**
Nearly everyone feels that way at first. However, most donors will tell you that you feel only a slight initial pinch, and 7-10 minutes later, you are finished and headed for the canteen. If you take the time (and courage) to make one donation, you'll wonder why you ever hesitated.
2. **I am too busy**
The entire process takes about an hour, and the actual blood donation time is only 7-10 minutes. If you stop to think that an hour of your time could mean a lifetime for a premature baby, someone with cancer undergoing chemotherapy, or someone who's had an accident, you might decide that you can make the time to give the gift of life.
3. **No-one ever asked me... I didn't realize my blood was needed**
Consider yourself asked! There is simply no other way to supply the blood needs of hospital patients but for the generous donations of people like you. Every two seconds someone in America needs blood. More than 38,000 donations are needed every day in communities across the U.S.
4. **I already gave this year**
You can give every 56 days. Many donors give 5 times a year!
5. **I am afraid I'll get AIDS**
It is not possible to get AIDS by donating blood to the American Red Cross. A new sterile needle is used for each donor and discarded afterwards.
6. **My blood isn't the right type**
Every type of blood is needed daily to meet patient needs. If you have a common blood type, there are many patients who need it, so it is in high demand. If you have a less common blood type, there are fewer donors available to give it, so it is in short supply.
7. **I don't have any blood to spare**
The average adult body has 10-12 pints of blood. Doctors say that healthy adults may give regularly because the body quickly replaces the blood you donate.
8. **I don't want to feel weak afterward**
Donating blood should not affect adversely a healthy adult because your body has plenty of blood. You will donate less than one pint, and your body, which constantly makes new blood, will replace the donated volume within 24 hours. Most people continue their usual activities after donating.
9. **They won't want my blood (I am too old / I've had an illness)**
If you have doubts, check with your physician. The qualified staff on duty at a blood drive or donor center will also review your medical history with you. There is no upper age limit to donate blood with the American Red Cross, and a great many medical conditions do not prevent you from donating blood, or may have done so only temporarily in the past.
10. **I have a rare blood type, so I'll wait until there is a special need**
Blood that is rare or special is almost always in short supply. There is a constant need for these blood types in order to avoid having to recruit specific blood types in a crisis

***Evening for Seniors/Retirees**

Mark out Monday June 19th after the 7 p.m. Mass for an interesting presentation and conversation among some of our seniors/retirees. The Vocations Committee has contacted Mr. Dave Feighan to provide some insights and begin a discussion. Why the Vocations Committee you ask? Because one of the goals of that committee was to expand our understanding of 'vocation' or calling from God beyond the usual understanding of priesthood or religious life. Seniors/retirees have a wealth of insights into how they have heard that call in many and varied ways. You don't have to be a senior to attend. Come join us a week from Monday.

***Reviewing How We Celebrate Eucharist (Part Three)**

As we prepare for the feast of Corpus Christi next weekend, at which we will celebrate the Eucharist in a "Teaching Mass" style, I have been reviewing some of the key ways we can more consciously and actively participate. Let's review how we enter into and celebrate the Liturgy of the Word here at SS. John and Paul.

You will notice that the Book of the Gospels is placed on the altar as part of the Opening Procession. This signals that the Eucharist is not just about taking bread and wine, praying over these elements, and receiving the body and blood of Christ at communion. The full Eucharist always includes a Liturgy of the Word, wherein we receive really and truly the presence of Christ the Living Word, with the proclamation of the

Gospel as the symbolic high point of that Liturgy of the Word.

There is a remarkable statement from 1965 in *Dei Verbum*, the Second Vatican Council's dogmatic constitution on divine revelation. Such a dogmatic constitution within the context of an ecumenical council is the most authoritative way the Church shares its teaching. In paragraph 21 the Church reminds its members that: *"The Church has always venerated the divine Scriptures just as she venerates the body of the Lord, since, especially in the sacred liturgy, she unceasingly receives and offers to the faithful the bread of life from the table both of God's word and of Christ's body."*

We receive the bread of life in the Eucharist not just when we partake of communion. We receive the bread of life when we actively partake of God's living Word. It is not enough to participate inactively up to the time of communion and then finally come forward and actively receive communion. The Eucharist includes the true presence of Christ experienced in and through being an active member of the praying assembly, in the sacramental presence of Christ through the priest, but most especially in and through the real presence of the living Word and receiving the sacramental body and blood of Christ at communion.

How do we prepare for and participate in this bread of life that comes through the Liturgy of the Word?

Not by trying to understand all the details of the Bible passages being used. We are inundated with so many words during that time—a reading from the Old Testament (or during the Easter season from the Acts of the Apostles), a sung rendition of part of one of the psalms, a reading from the New Testament other than the gospels, a brief gospel acclamation with a Scripture quote, all finally culminating in a proclamation from one of the four gospels. There is no way to absorb all these words. Even with the best lectors, sound systems, and willing listeners, there are too many words to hear and understand. So, something else must be intended by proclaiming all these words.

The key is to develop the habit of listening with our hearts and not just our heads. Have you ever listened to a

song—one that you may have heard any number of times—and suddenly be struck by one of its phrases or images? It pops out at you, reminds you of something in your life, touches you more deeply at that point of your life. That is listening with your heart. Similarly the Eucharist's Liturgy of the Word is always an invitation to listen with one's heart.

It is an excellent practice to have read and reflected on the readings ahead of time. We provide anyone interested, free of charge, with the entire year's worth of Sunday readings. Just ask for the "Sunday's Word" booklet. But when the time of the Liturgy of the Word comes, it is time (unless you have difficulty hearing) to set down any books and listen as though you are listening to a song. Let the words come into the mind and stir up images, questions, connections to your life. Don't try to understand the context of the events taking place. This is not the time for Bible study. If some strong image or question or connection comes up, begin to go with that as a meditation. Turn it into a prayer or question to God. This takes practice. We so quickly tune out when we lose track of the literal meaning of the sentences, or the reader is too soft or stumbles over some phrase. No, hang in there. Practice praying a little prayer—"Let me hear with my heart, O Lord, what you need me to hear"—and let the words continue to come into the mind and pass as images, phrases, connections to the heart.

As a way to emphasize this "listening with our hearts," rather than giving a homily I will read the gospel several times, in a more meditative way, inviting you to slow the mind down and open the heart. Afterward, if a couple of people feel so inclined, I will ask you to share what your heart was hearing as you listened.

The Bread of Life, the true and real presence of the risen Lord, comes to us in and through the Liturgy of the Word. It is an essential part of celebrating Eucharist. If we develop the habit of listening with our heart, then we will find the remainder of the Eucharistic action—Eucharistic prayer and communion—to be much more connected to our lives and meaningful.

***Immigration Reform**

We have been hearing a lot in the news about pending immigration reform in the Congress. This issue truly stirs up a lot of passion on all sides. Self-styled vigilantes are offering their time and service to help patrol borders. Money is being appropriated to put up larger and longer barriers. The potential for violence and exploitation of immigrants increases. While there is no one magical answer that will allow full justice to emerge, the Church has been and will continue to be a strong voice in the debate. We have a long-developed Catholic social doctrine that insists that the dignity of every human being be protected, that affirms the right to legitimate immigration, that encourages reforms that will allow for a decrease in exploitation of immigrants, that insists on the protection and care of the most vulnerable, especially the young.

Of the two bills that now need reconciling, the Catholic bishops of the United States have publicly expressed their support for the Senate version and have criticized the harsher House of Representatives version. Next week we will include a bulleting insert on "Catholic Social Teaching and Immigration." I encourage you to read it and then contact our congressional representatives to express your views. There are several websites that can give you background information. President Bush's comprehensive reform ideas are at www.whitehouse.gov/infocus/immigration. The United States Conference of Catholic bishops have some material on the issue at www.usccb.org/mrs/mrp/shtml. But the best website, from a coalition of Catholic organizations including the bishops, is available at www.justiceforimmigrants.org/action.html.

Immigration reform is such a very important part of our social need in this country. Let's not allow our desire for some better regulation keep us from preserving the dignity of every immigrant, legal or illegal, documented or undocumented.

May we experience the invitation from God in all that we do to enter into the communion of divine persons we call the Holy Trinity. May God—Father, Son, Spirit—bless us.
