

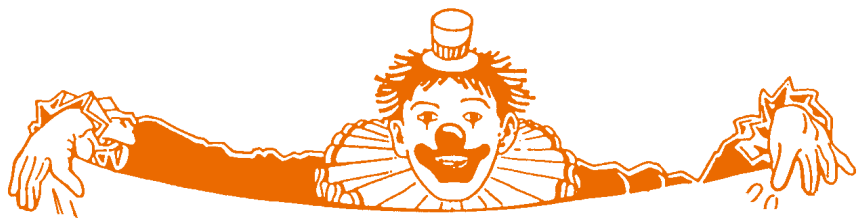
Pastor's Perspective

*Follow Up to the Teaching Mass

The five integral parts to doing Eucharist: 1) **We gather** and are willing to be one community of faith. 2) **We listen** willing to say "yes" to whatever that living Word of God plants in our heart and minds. 3) **We offer thanks and praise** to the Father for everything in our lives in and with and through Jesus and by the Holy Spirit. 4) **We eat and drink** the Sacrament, the body and blood of the risen Lord. 5) **We are sent forth**, willing to be that body broken and blood poured out so that God's love can be more visible in this world. That is the eucharistic rhythm of life we then live, day by day, Sunday by Sunday.

Eucharist is not simply about Sunday worship. It is about living life. It is truly and simply, if done consciously and with faith, the deepest way to live life in this universe. How do we know this? Because history is changed by every person who lives and that is how Jesus has marked human history for all time. We now know, because of Jesus' life, that among the many ways we can live life, to be most in sync with the deepest rhythm of the universe, God's own rhythm so to speak, means to have a eucharistic life. Note well: **not merely celebrate** Eucharist, as important as that is. But rather, **live** a eucharistic life, something that is not confined to Catholics or even Christians. As Catholic Christians we have a privileged access into and ability to be shaped by such a life through our full, conscious and active participation in the Sunday Eucharist.

***Changes in the Mass prayers**

Some of you might have read in the newspapers about the changes in the Mass which the U. S. Bishops approved at their June meeting. These changes are now sent to Rome for approval. If approved (not guaranteed because the bishops did not agree to everything proposed by the commission writing the texts), then they can be published into missals and the bishops will set a date for implementation. That could still be a couple of years or even several years away, though eventually we will get new texts for the Mass.

The goal behind the changes seems to be two-fold. First, there is a desire to bring the English translation (or whatever language is being used) of the Latin texts more closely in agreement with the literal wording of the Latin original so that there is a clear connection to the Latin original. In the

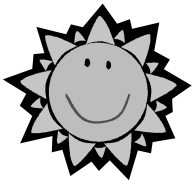

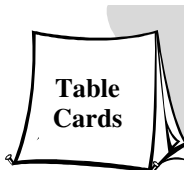

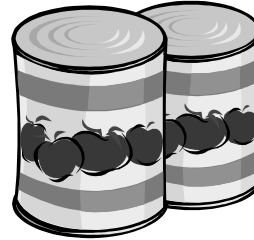

 current translation they were allowed to substitute the underlying meaning of the Latin original with more straightforward English. For example, we now pray "Lord, I am not worthy to receive you, but only say the word and I shall be healed." The new text would read "Lord, I am not worthy that you should enter under my roof; only say the word and my soul shall be healed." That is a more direct translation of the Latin. It brings in the Scriptural words of the man who seeks Jesus' help in healing his servant. But it adds a literal image "roof" that the earlier translation avoided by pointing out the meaning intended by the image. And it uses the word "soul" which can be misunderstood as referring to a part of who we are, rather than to the whole of our being, which is the intended meaning. The current text we use does a better job at getting at the underlying meaning. The new text would do a better job at connecting us to the underlying Latin text.

Secondly, there seems to be a fear that too much everyday or colloquial English is being used. In a 2001 document called *Liturgiam Authenticam* ("The Authentic Liturgy") the Vatican Congregation in charge even talked about a "sacred style" in the liturgical language which might transcend the changes that everyday speech undergoes. This all flows from a concern that the language of worship should have a certain gravity or solemnity rather than be too colloquial. That document, however, was severely criticized by many theologians (including one of the most knowledgeable and highly respected—and conservative—professors who teaches in Rome), as severely misunderstanding the history of the Roman (Latin) rite and so contrary to our authentic Roman Catholic tradition.

That is the reason I am personally saddened that our U.S. Bishops have not shown stronger leadership in dialoguing with Rome on these issues. It would have made more sense for the bishops to wait until there was some significant change needed so that it doesn't look like we are continually fiddling with minor details,

just to make Catholic life more upsetting.

When all is said and done, however, the changes will be minor, and, once implemented and learned, they will be with us for many generations. In the end, the faith and spirit of prayer among us is the most important thing.

***Vicariate Meeting**

We have one more North Macomb Vicariate meeting before the summer hiatus. Two items of interest to share. One is that St. Maximilian Kolbe and St. Francis in New Haven have now been officially merged into one parish. I don't know the details (what name they will use and so forth), but this came as a result of the Together in Faith process. I think that means that the land that St. Max owns and had been reserving for a future church site will be sold. Down the road the issue of whether the St. Francis site is sold and merged in with an eventual new parish near 26 Mile and Gratiot will be finalized.

The second item has to do with young adult ministry (18-35 year olds). The diocese has developed a "corridor" model for such ministry, aligning every vicariate with some college/university and hiring both a campus minister and young adult minister to work with the vicariates. The vicariates, in turn, provide office space and expenses for the young adult minister and recommend people to serve on a young adult ministry council to help shape programs/outreach in the area. Our vicariate is paired with Central Macomb and assigned to work with the campus ministry connected with Macomb Community College. A new campus minister was hired some months ago and the diocese is in the process of hiring a young adult minister as well.

Clearly there is huge diversity among 18-35 year old demographic. If you are in that demographic and want to work with a young adult council, let me know. Meetings would be on a monthly basis most likely. It might be especially helpful if someone is attending Macomb

Community College but that is not necessary. It would also be good to find a married couple in their late 20s or so who would be willing to help. Let me know.

***Summer Stewardship**

Please keep up the commitment to Sunday stewardship throughout the summer. I know many attend Mass at their cottage area. But the parish does count on and needs the year-long support. The envelope packets usually have an extra envelope for "make-up" Sundays. Please try to be consistent. This will be our third year with a budget pegged at the \$11,600 per week level. This past fiscal year we have been averaging a little over \$11,200. The big drop-off in the summer months was a key reason why we didn't quite make the \$11,600 figure. Let's see if we can do better this year.

On a very positive note, however, I want to thank all who made last year's C.S.A. the best ever and this year's looking even better. We received our final report on C.S.A. 2005 and of the \$152,000 pledged last year \$148,000 was collected. That meant a return to the parish of about \$75,000 during this past fiscal year. C.S.A. 2006 is at about \$154,000 with still a couple of weeks to go. If you haven't yet turned in your C.S.A. pledge/donation, please try to do so before the end of the month, if at all possible. Every dollar comes back to the parish now for its own use.

***Scripture Quote**

The gospel this week contains the words "*Who then is this, that even the wind and the sea obey him?*" When we are facing a tough challenge this week, a person or situation that threatens to get the better of us and hurt us, pray that sentence a few times. The Lord is with us. This person or situation will not have the final word. We do not have to give in to hurt or fear.

Online Offertory

Did you know that SS. John & Paul has parishioners who support the parish by using online banking? Every week we receive offertory checks that our parishioners have authorized their bank to send us. These offerings are treated just as if it was dropped in the Sunday collection since an envelope number is printed on the check.

Electronic Sunday Offerings is another way to consistently support the parish automatically. Electronic Sunday Offerings (ESO) is a pre-authorized payment plan where parish members authorize monthly or bi-monthly deductions to be made from their checking or savings account to the parish's account.
