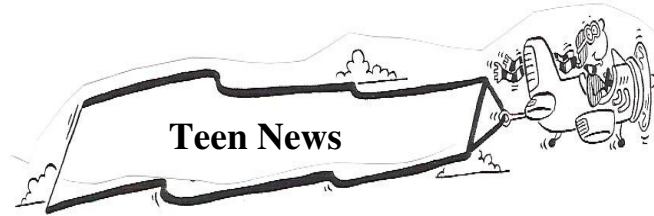

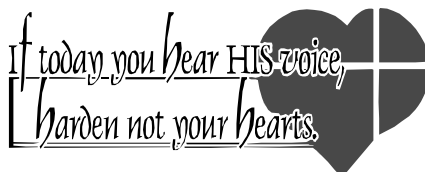
You are invited to come in and browse and maybe find something of interest. Self check-out is easy and loan time is flexible.

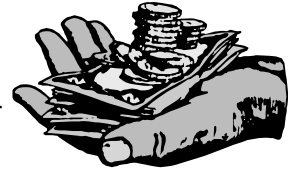

## Wealth

Lk. 12: 13-21

In today's Gospel Jesus warns against greed, and stresses the foolishness of depending on material things for one's security rather than on God.

**AVOID GREED IN ALL ITS FORMS.**



It's not how many possessions we have but how we enjoy the ones we have that matters. Wealth is not in possession, but in enjoyment. It almost seems though these days that we, as a society, have lost our ability for enjoyment. It's almost as if we have to have more and more expensive wireless gadgets every time something new comes out. We just can't seem to enjoy the simple things of life the way a child can.

It's really not the amount of money or possessions we have, but our capacity for enjoyment of life that makes us rich. To seek wealth or possessions while not being able to enjoy is to be like a blind person who collects DVD's. We can become possessed by things. Sometimes we are so busy adding to our possessions that we have no time to enjoy life.

Money and power can imprison and inhibit just as much as barred windows and iron chains. People have gone to prison to discover how little we can get by with, and what extraordinary spiritual freedom and peace that can bring. It frees us to develop the spirit. Sometimes we don't know what we are striving for and we tire ourselves out seeking material things, and live our lives out completely without ever realizing our spiritual greatness.

We rush about all day but don't know what we are looking for. A gardener could raise thousands of roses in the same garden, and still not know what he is looking for in a rose, yet it could be found in a single rose. When we distinguish between our needs and our wants, we will be surprised to realize how little is enough.

The words in Ecclesiastes: 'Vanity of vanities. All is vanity. What does a man gain for all his toil and strain that he had undergone under the sun?' These words paint a pessimistic view of life, but they are meant to make us ask what's the purpose of life? Certainly it's not about accumulating possessions which in any case have to be left behind.

Earthly things can never satisfy the human heart. Only God can give us the kind of happiness our hearts long for. St. Paul says, 'Let your thoughts be on heavenly things, not on the things that are on the earth.' And Jesus urges us not to store up treasures on earth but to make ourselves rich in the sight of God. What makes us rich in the sight of God is not what we own, or even what we've done, but what we are.



## A Family Perspective by Bud Ozar

In today's Gospel, Jesus warns "life does not consist of possessions. This is not what matters to God." Our worth comes from within; who we are is more important than what we have or how we look.



## The Things You Have Prepared, to Whom Will They Belong?

This week's gospel reading has Luke dealing with the issue of material possessions. During Jesus' journey to Jerusalem, he instructs his followers on the requirements of discipleship. Jesus states very clearly his concern with greed, followed by a story that Jesus uses to illustrate his point that greed can block one from acquiring what is really important... a deeper relationship with God. This gospel identifies getting rich with material possessions for oneself alone as the opposite of growing rich in God's eyes.

Greed is an obsessive desire for possessions. Possessions in themselves are not bad. Greed involves an attachment to possessions. The Church has named greed as one of the deadly or capital sins, because it can take over and direct a person's life rather than allowing our relationship with God to be our life focus. Saying "yes" to the example set before us by Jesus will allow us to be rich in the eyes of God.

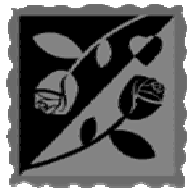


## Soup Kitchen News

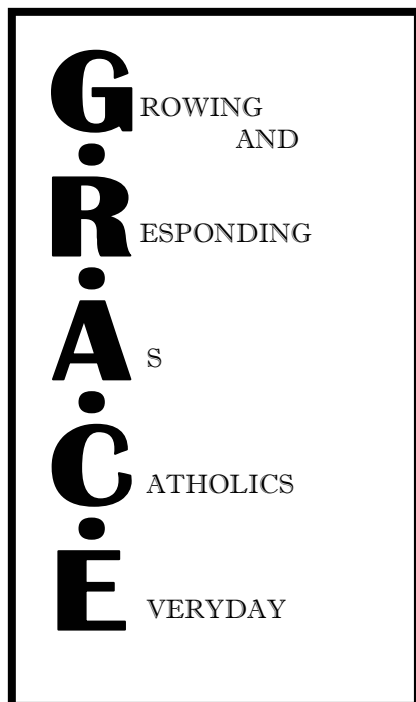

We call our parish formation program "GRACE": **G**rowing and **R**esponding **A**s **C**atholics **E**veryday. You may go online and read more about this approach to formation at our [www.ssjohnandpaul.org](http://www.ssjohnandpaul.org) website. Click on "Faith Formation" and then on the "G.R.A.C.E." link. For registration forms you can look under "New or Noteworthy" on the home page or on the "G.R.A.C.E." link as well.

G.R.A.C.E. takes an intergenerational approach. Faith formation is not just for children. It means we no longer make the child and school-based format the main model for our program. We place a premium on children learning at their own level, but always with parental and adult modeling of that learning. We place a premium on parents or another responsible adult being actively involved in all aspects of a child's faith formation. The nine underlying principles of our faith formation approach are listed on the next page. There are many other details to understand about the full program. Some are included here. But please call the office to clarify any questions.

## **Three Main Components of G.R.A.C.E.**

In addition to the foundation provided by weekly Sunday Eucharist and daily prayer and Christian living, there are three key formational components to faith formation at SS. John and Paul:

### **Monthly Gatherings:**

A 2 1/2 hour session, once a month for eight months. Families/adults choose a specific evening (Sunday, Tuesday, Wednesday, or Friday). NB: Due to space limitations in our buildings, we have to designate some evenings for specific-aged children. Get a registration form for more details.

#### **Format for Monthly Sessions:**

- **A monthly session on a specific evening of the week.** Each family/individual adult chooses a specific evening of the week and attends that night for their monthly session.
- **A meal together** to begin the evening, which always includes an opening catechetical activity to introduce the theme.
- **The catechetical theme** connected to one of the eight major catechetical areas is explored in age specific or mixed groups, depending on topic. When age specific, grades 1-2, grades 3-4, grades 5-6, grades 7-8, high school teens, and adults will all form their own separate groups.
- **A parish event.** Each monthly session focuses on a pertinent upcoming event so that we might enter into that event in a deeper, more faith-filled way. The event may be parish-wide or wider; religious or secular.
- **A packet of take-home material.** So that families/individuals can continue to explore and apply the catechetical theme.

### **Age Appropriate Gatherings:**

Various gatherings for adults, young adults, teens, junior high, and younger children will take place in addition to the monthly sessions. Families with children, please note the following:

- **Grades 1-6:** There are six grade level gatherings, 3 in the fall and 3 in winter. Each grade meets separately to learn/review specific material that children of a particular age should know. For 2007-2008 there is a choice of Tuesday afternoon sessions (4:45-6 p.m.) or Tuesday evening sessions (6:30-7:45 p.m.)  
**Fall sessions: Tuesday October 23, October 30, November 6**  
**Winter sessions: Tuesday January 22, January 29, February 5**
- **For high school and junior high:** There will be opportunities for retreats/days of prayer, service, wider meetings with other youth, and times of fun. Mrs. Karen Peters will mail such event information directly to families of junior high and high schoolers.
- **Early Childhood (late 3s, 4, and 5 year olds):** Sunday Early Childhood program during the 9:30 a.m. Mass. A separate registration (available at the office or online) is needed for this. Meets 3 Sundays a month from late September through April. Registration in this program is required for any family wanting to bring a young child to the Wednesday evening monthly G.R.A.C.E. session.

### **Sacramental Preparation Gatherings:**

All the sacraments require extra time for catechesis and preparation. Any child preparing for First Eucharist, First Reconciliation, or Confirmation is required to attend such gatherings, along with a parent in addition to the monthly and age-appropriate gatherings mentioned above. A full calendar of all such sacrament-specific gatherings will be mailed to families before the end of summer and posted online at our website.

PRINCIPLES THAT GUIDE  
OUR FAITH FORMATION  
DECISIONS AT  
SS. JOHN AND PAUL**

*There are several core principles that we are committed to and they have guided our decisions for how we have structured faith formation at the parish.*

- 1. Catholic faith formation is life-long and ongoing.**
- 2. Full, engaged, and meaningful participation in the Sunday Eucharist is the goal and cornerstone of all Catholic faith formation.**
- 3. Catholic faith formation pays great attention to preparation for and celebration of the Sacraments.**
- 4. Faith formation starts with an adult-centered model but always includes child, teen, and young adult-centered opportunities for learning.**
- 5. Faith formation involves the whole community when possible.**
- 6. Parents of children are the primary formation directors for their children and need to be actively involved in every aspect of their children's faith formation.**
- 7. Faith formation is strengthened when intergenerational gatherings can be seen as central to the process.**
- 8. Faith formation is strengthened when catechetical formation is tied to concrete events in the life of the parish community.**
- 9. Faith formation cannot neglect age and situation-appropriate opportunities to develop more systematic catechetical learning.**

## Ten Commandments of a Friendly Church

- 1) Speak to people, even if you don't know their names. There is nothing as nice or cheerful as a friendly word or greeting.
- 2) Smile at people. It takes seventy-two muscles to frown and only fourteen to smile. Your smile is one of your finest assets. Use it regularly.
- 3) Call people by name. The sweetest music to any person's ear is his/her own name.
- 4) Be friendly and helpful. If you want a friend, be one.
- 5) Be cordial. Speak and act as if everything you do is a genuine pleasure. Try to look happy, and you'll be happy.
- 6) Be genuinely interested in people. If you try, you can like everybody. Don't limit yourself to a few friends when there are so many likable people all around you.
- 7) Be generous with praise and sparing with criticism.
- 8) Be considerate of the feelings of others.
- 9) Watch for ways to serve others. What we do for others counts most in life.
- 10) Add to all of these a good sense of humor, a generous dash of patience, and a dash of humility.
