Pastor's Perspective

***Oops!**

I apologize to those at last Saturday's Mass who came, thinking that there would be a chance after Mass to have throats blessed. That was my intention when I wrote about it two weeks ago, but I got preoccupied and it completely slipped my mind. On the other hand, much more important than having one's throat blessed through the intercession of St. Blase is the celebration of Eucharist and the strength it provides. And, if you have more serious lung/throat ailments the sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick is always available to you.

***Lent**

Yes, Lent. We need to be thinking about what we will be doing to mark this important season of prayer, fasting, and other penance. Wednesday February 21st is Ash Wednesday. We will have Mass at 9 a.m. and 7 p.m. In addition, we will have prayer services with the distribution of ashes at 7 a.m., 12 noon and 4:30 p.m. I understand that many will have school off that day. Parents, what a great opportunity to have your children experience this important Catholic reality of beginning the Lenten penitential season with the marking of ashes.

The three traditional focal points for Lenten penance are:

1) **Extra prayer:** how will you incorporate prayer more deeply into your life this Lent? A few extra minutes in the morning and/or evening or at noon and midafternoon? Some spiritual reading or reading and reflection on the Bible? Take one gospel and read it slowly and meditatively, perhaps throughout the days of Lent. The Church will be especially focusing on the gospel of Luke this year. For those who find them helpful, we will once again have the "Little Black Books" available, starting next weekend, so that you can incorporate a daily 5-6 minute prayer and reflection time into your life.

2) **Fasting:** Fridays are to be days of abstinence from meat; Ash Wednesday and Good Friday days of abstinence and fasting (only one full meal, two other small meals for sustenance, if needed; no eating between meals; water and juices anytime). What will you add to that to help remind yourself that we are in the Lenten season? Follow the fasting regulations on Fridays and not just abstain from meat? Or choose another day of the week? Or maybe there are other material realities that we can let go of this Lent to remind us to pray more often, be more

Poor But Rich in Faith and Trust

Lk. 6:17.20-26



When Jesus says, ‘Blessed are the poor,’ he is not giving a blessing to starvation and misery. What is being blessed is reliance on God. Those who put their trust in human things will be disappointed; those who put their trust in God will not. Only God can fill our emptiness; only God can satisfy the hunger of our hearts. But often God is the last one we turn to rather than the first.

The rich tend to rely on their riches. It’s this world that matters. God and the other world is distant, remote and hazy. The poor, on the other hand, tend to turn to God instinctively. For them the very hazards and difficulties of life make God and the other world close and real.

It is a fact that in poverty life becomes harder and more threatening; it also becomes richer, because the fewer expectations we have, the more the good things of life become unexpected gifts that we accept with gratitude. This is why Jesus says, ‘Blessed are the poor, the Kingdom of Heaven is theirs.’

One day a poor man was walking along a street when he came upon a beggar who asked him for alms. Ashamed, the man answered, ‘Sorry, but I’m just as poor as you are.’ When the beggar heard this he thanked the man for his gift. But the man did not understand and asked the beggar why he was thanking him. He hadn’t given him anything. But the beggar replied that he did indeed. He gave his honesty, his poverty and his trust.

God is not poor, but we are. Even so, there is something we can give God. We can give him our honesty, our poverty and our trust.

Rainbows

Many children today are hurting because of a death of a parent or family member or because of a divorce or separation in their family. Grieving is a natural process. When grief does not have an opportunity to be resolved, its impact can be destructive. It surfaces in children's behavior, academics, physical and/or emotional well-being. Even those who appear to be coping are often struggling inside with the churning, conflicting emotions of grief.

Children go through the same grieving stages as adults, but on their own level. Since their parents are suffering as well, they may be unable initially to support them.

Rainbows was created to provide children an opportunity for healing after their painful loss. These children need and deserve someone they can talk to and trust — someone who will listen to their story while guiding them through the grief process.

Rainbows is a peer support group facilitated by well-trained, caring adults who help the children put their feelings into words, work through their grief, and rebuild their self-esteem.

attentive to the Spirit of God in our lives? What about fasting from TV for a portion of each week? Or fast from the radio on the way to work? Remember, fasting and prayer are intimately related, because we don't simply fast. We turn that time into a time of prayer and reflection.

3) **Almsgiving:** Although over the centuries this became usually just a giving of money—and that is still fine—any way that we extend ourselves to others in need, via time and energy, is a type of almsgiving. Where and to whom is God inviting us to give our time and attention? How can we as families connect to the needs of others more concretely? Again, almsgiving is intimately tied to fasting and prayer. We fast so as to be less focused on our material needs. We pray so as to be more open to the promptings of God's Spirit. This in turn helps us to see more clearly the needs of others and respond.

You will be receiving a Lenten mailing from the parish staff next week. We will once again focus on the Fridays of Lent as an opportunity to connect our personal Lenten journeys with the wider parish community and Church. Think about letting Fridays become a key day of prayer and fasting for yourselves and your family during Lent. We will once again have the Simple Soup meals each Friday. Sign-up to make a non-meat soup; come and enjoy those of others and share in some time of conversation and prayer.

We will begin and end, as has become our custom, with the first Friday of Lent (February 23rd) and the last Friday of Lent (March 30th) being days of adoration. There will be Mass at 9 a.m. each of those two Fridays, after which the Blessed Sacrament will be placed on the altar. The Church will remain open for prayer and adoration until 7 p.m.; then we close with Benediction. Please sign up on the bulletin board so that each ½ hour time slot has people praying throughout the day. If you have not taken time to pray in the presence of the Blessed

Sacrament, this would be a good opportunity to do so. On the other four Fridays of Lent we will have soup and stations of the cross or soup and a speaker. Look for the mailing for more details.

Lent is traditionally a season for the people of God to renew their hearts, renew their sense of commitment to God and especially to sharing the way of Christ. There will be opportunities to celebrate the sacrament of Reconciliation; our adult and family formation will focus on conversion and the praying of the Stations of the Cross; our personal Lenten choices will remind us to not be afraid to share in the cross of Christ so that others might have life. In turn, Lent is a special season for those preparing for full initiation in the Church. We pray and fast for and with them as the Spirit of God prepares them for that complete identification with the Church.

***Rite of Sending for Election**

Part of that preparation for those who will be fully initiated at the Easter Vigil is to be "sent" to the diocesan cathedral Church—Blessed Sacrament, Detroit—so that Cardinal Maida can officially name them as the "elect" (unbaptized candidates) or official candidates (for those already baptized) for the sacraments of initiation. Their names are enrolled on the list of the elect and candidates so that the whole diocesan Church prays for them. Next Sunday at the 9:30 a.m. Mass we will celebrate the "Rite of Sending for Election" to mark our own catechumens and candidates next step. No longer will the catechumens be called catechumens or "learners." Rather, they are the specially chosen, the "Elect." And no longer are the other baptized candidates simply preparing one day for initiation. They become official candidates for initiation through Confirmation and First Eucharist.

As with our First Eucharist children, we will get their names and photos up soon, so that you can be praying for them during this last stage of preparation for full initiation.

***G.R.A.C.E.**

Are you willing to Grow and Respond As a Catholic in your Everyday life? Our new faith formation program will be called G.R.A.C.E. to remind us that such formation does not end at a sacrament such as Confirmation nor at an age such as 13-14. It is life-long and especially important for adults. In any area of life that is important we continue to learn, grow, develop, explore. Is not faith just as important as other areas? More important, I hope! G.R.A.C.E. will be tested out the week of March 4th. Remember, it is not just for families and their children. It is for everybody. For families with children, the cost of the meal and materials is covered by your registration fee from the beginning of the year. No extra cost. For adults without children or teens, no cost either, but a simple meal will be provided. A free will donation can be made to cover the cost of the meal, if you choose (\$3-5 maximum).

There will be four evenings to choose from this first time, each evening having the same format. Please note that although we will be using Monday evening this one time, most likely that will not be an option in the future. In fact, we will be asking you to tell us what other day might work well, when you evaluate your experience. In any case, for our March G.R.A.C.E. adults without children have the option of Sunday, Monday, Tuesday or Wednesday evenings. [NB: it is possible that Sunday might get filled, since we have reserved it especially for families who have a 7th-8th grade child]. For families with a 7th or 8th grader, Sunday and Wednesday are your two options. For families with a first through sixth grader (and no junior high child), Monday, Tuesday, and Wednesday are all possible. Remember, that whatever session you attend, your whole family attends. There will be some time together and some time in age-appropriate groups.

Are you willing to continue your formation, helping others just by being there, listening, asking questions, sharing? If so, you need to be part of G.R.A.C.E.!

*Sunday Scripture

For the second reading, during this brief stretch of Ordinary Time, we have been reading excerpts from Paul's First Letter to the Corinthians. In chapter fifteen (last week, this week and next week), Paul addresses the importance of and reality of Christ's being raised from the dead. Last week we heard Paul state that Jesus appeared in risen form to Cephas (Simon Peter), the Twelve, then 500 disciples and then to Paul himself. This week Paul reminds us that "If Christ has not been raised, your faith is in vain...If for this life only we have hoped in Christ, we are the most pitiable people of all."

Our faith lives or falls on the resurrection of Christ. We make decisions that for this life might seem odd (for example, entering a season of Lent with extra prayer and fasting) or without personal payback. But we do so, because we know that we live not just for immediate reward or even for any reward on our part. We live for the kingdom of God and the hope that all might share fully in God's life.
