*Planning for the Future

Last week I went into more detail about the shift we will be making in our faith formation approach starting in the fall. We are calling it G.R.A.C.E.: Growing and Responding As Catholics Everyday. Christian Service will be undertaking its own major new initiative in late fall which will involve the whole parish as well. We will become a host church for the Macomb Rotating Emergency Shelter Team or MCREST as it is commonly known. In both cases parish facilities and the involvement of many parish members across the board will be needed for these to be successful.

This leads me to another topic I have been writing about off and on for the past year: the limits we face with current facilities. Both of the new initiative mentioned above will tax our existing facilities to their limit. Thankfully, your Parish Pastoral Council, as a result of the goal-setting process a couple of years ago, has now begun in earnest the steps to look at future building plans. Originally there was a favorable spirit at looking to expand existing church facilities. In fact, six years ago, in better economic times and when the diocese loaned money to parishes for building projects, there was a lot of work done on preparing to build an entirely new church building, including purchasing the extra acreage we now own (but have a \$1 million debt on; thankfully at this time non-interest

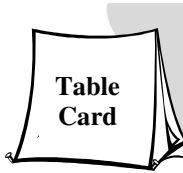

To Serve As Prophet

As described in the Old Testament, a prophet is one who speaks the word of God. Prophets like Moses or Elijah played a remarkable role in Israel's history. When Israel's faith was undermined, it survived with new force through the word of the prophets.

The prophet saw life from the perspective of God and preached accordingly. In today's first reading we hear from the prophet Jeremiah, as he is reminded of God's faithfulness and protection in times of fear of their enemies.

Two themes from this reading will reappear in today's gospel: the mission of the prophet to the nations, and the resistance of some to the prophet's ministry.

Jesus came as a prophet to all nations. Jesus' audience reacts angrily to his claim that in his ministry he is fulfilling Isaiah's prophecy of the coming of a messiah. Jesus would continue throughout his ministry to encounter resistance from those he reached out to and who most needed salvation.

Jesus' persistence in the face of opposition are fundamental to each of us in our own role as prophet. This role was given to us when we were anointed at Baptism in this prayer: "As Christ was anointed Priest, Prophet, and King, so may you live always as a member of his body..."

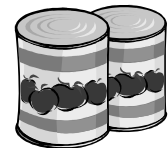
The following letter is in response to gifts received from our Christmas Sharing Tree.

bearing). But costs for new buildings the size we would need (\$5-7 million minimum) and the inability to borrow any significant amount of money through the diocese put an end to that.

In looking at enlarging the existing church facilities (up to 900 seats from the current 550), we came to realize that though there has been steady growth in parish membership, the addition of the extra Mass on Sunday, combined with only slowly growing attendance at Eucharist, allows us a number of years before we max out the seating we already have. Also, we determined that the cost of such expansion on the church would be roughly equivalent to the building of a permanent Activities Center/hall/office complex. Thirdly, we noted that the existing Activities Center was built with pre-manufactured units without water, restrooms, or fully equipped facilities, because it was intended as a temporary (10 years or so) stop gap measure until something more permanent could be done. Fourthly, it seems possible at this time to plan for a permanent facility without touching the extra acreage to the north and that gives us more flexibility with how to handle that \$1 million debt in the future. Fifthly, as great as the temporary Activities Building is—and it has given us so much more flexibility—we are not able to do everything many parishes do, because of its limitations. And sixthly, it takes a bit of time to go from initial conception to approval to planning to fund-raising to building. Each year we delay starting that process makes it more likely that we will not have the needed facility in the future.

So the focus of the Pastoral Council changed. As we move into the future, and if we want a parish with the ability to grow and continue to be a full-service, complete parish, then we will need to put our efforts into planning for and building a permanent Activities Center in the short-term and mid-term. Once that is done and paid for, then the expansion of the church can take place in the long-term. The parish Worship Commission will continue to explore upgrading and improving the worship area—lighting, sound, windows, flowing

water baptismal font, and so on—but will have to do so within operating budget monies (rather than the special fund-raising) and any such improvements must have the ability to be incorporated into any eventual church expansion.

This is a critical but exciting time in the parish's history. Over the next year or so your response to the parish council's initiatives will determine just how the parish will move toward the future. The council is preparing a more detailed mailing of the background and thinking process that has led it to this point. You will receive that in late February or early March. Then they will hold a series of open forum/feedback meetings to get more specific input from any or all interested parish members. From that they will decide whether to approach Cardinal Maida for permission to form a building committee and start the process of officially planning a new building.

People are always more important than buildings. But proper facilities can make a huge difference in serving the needs of both parish members and wider outreach, in making the parish a place where children and families can gather and be formed, and in how a parish is able to live out its mission and ministry as a Church. I remember the process that my last parish went through a dozen years ago as it determined the need for and carried out the building of a new facility. Much work, some doubters, many, many generous and encouraging supporters. In the end, they have a facility that has made a difference in their sense of community and parish. And that parish was in a slowly declining area. We are in a growing parish and a growing area. Wouldn't it be a wonderful thing to help chart this parish's future in a positive way?

***Anointing of the Sick at Monday Mass**

Our quarterly Mass for the Anointing of the Sick is this Monday at 7 p.m. Please let people know of its availability. The basic rule of thumb is

that the anointing is for anyone, from the age of reason on up, who is facing a serious illness in their life. It is a sacrament that is meant to accompany you in the midst of the illness, not simply at the end of life. It is a sacrament for physical, emotional or other illnesses. For example, addictive behaviors like alcoholism, drugs, gambling are all illnesses that are serious, and the sacrament is a proper way to bring such illnesses before God and the community in prayer. No one knows what is being prayed for. Only that the person needs prayer. The sacrament can be repeated if you are continuing to struggle with your illness or are elderly and in a generally frail state.

There are two parts to the Sacrament of Anointing of the Sick. The first is the laying on of hands in silence and prayer for the person who is suffering. We ask that all who are present place their hands over someone who is preparing for the sacramental anointing. Then the priest individually anoints each person who is in need of the sacrament with these words:

“Through this holy anointing, may the Lord in his love and mercy help you with the grace of the Holy Spirit. May the Lord who frees you from sin, save you and raise you up.”

We anoint the forehead as a sign of all that a person is, feels, and thinks. We anoint the open palms of the hands as a sign of all that a person does and all the relationships a person is connected to. We pray for the whole: physical, spiritual (forgiveness), emotional, relational healing.

Join us Monday. Bring a family member or friend who you think should celebrate this sacrament.

What a wonderful way to take a break from the errands and busyness and show your children your own commitment to continuing formation. Also, we handle them as catechist formation topics and so anyone attending will receive a certificate for having completed the topic of "Prayer" (one of twenty such topics).

***Blessing on the Feast of St. Blase**

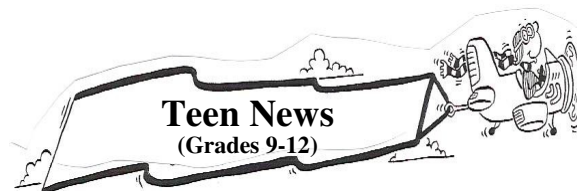
Since the feast of St. Blase falls on a Saturday this year, the blessing of throats will be given as a general blessing at the end of the 5 p.m. Mass that day.
