Pastor's Perspective

*Parish Council Feedback

Since I have to write this column early, before the weekend, I do not know what comments people have shared with the council members. Nor do I know what the council itself will say, after seeing all the responses. I know in passing that a few have mentioned the economy and how difficult the job and money situation is at present. I can definitely see how that will be a factor. But it takes several years (5-7) to go from starting the process to full completion. If we wait until the economy is strong, that might mean an additional several years of delay. In turn the costs will continue to climb, making the challenge of raising the money all that much more daunting; to say nothing of having no alternative space than presently exists for all parish events and activities.

Third Scrutiny Sunday

This weekend will be our third and final scrutiny for our Elect who are preparing for the Easter sacraments of initiation. As with the previous two weekends, we will take some extra time during the Penitential Rite at all the non-scrutiny Masses to reflect on our own need to let go of sin, to resist evil, to turn everything over to the Lord.

Again, there will be NO opening prayer on these days. The stations will begin promptly at 4:45 p.m. and 6:30 p.m. which ever time is your child's session.

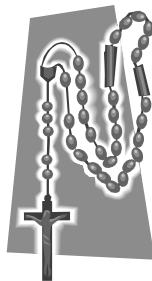

The Way of Christ

The self-righteous person: he has high standards, makes exacting demands, accepts no excuses, makes no exceptions, tolerates no slip-ups—where others are concerned. But when it comes to himself, he is so very blind and all-forgiving.



The genuinely holy person: a compassionate and understanding person towards those who fall. We see this in the lives of the saints and especially in the life of Jesus. What a wonderful example of it in the way he dealt with the woman caught in adultery.

On the surface only one sin seems to be involved—the sin of adultery, but there are other very serious ones here also.

It is the sin of the Scribes and Pharisees in how they exposed her to the most humiliating kind of shaming—public shaming. They had no regard for her feelings, no shred of concern for her as a person. They would use her to entrap Jesus. They gladly sacrifice her as bait. To use another person in this way is most degrading.

They, the Scribes and Pharisees, had a murderous attitude towards Jesus. There is something marvelously gentle and subtle in the way Jesus dealt with them. He did not condemn them. He exposed them but didn't spell it out in public. He didn't judge them. He invited them to judge themselves. Instead of answering their question straight out, he wrote on the ground giving them time to examine their consciences.

What a contrast between the way the Pharisees treated the woman and the way Jesus treated her. He refused to condemn her. He corrected her ever so gently. His approach was a combination of courtesy, gentleness and tenderness. His mission was about mercy and forgiveness, not judgment and condemnation.

There is a lesson to be learned here. Condemning another involves sin. There is a time to correct and there is an art in doing so. It consists of being kind and honest at the same time.

We must be willing to extend to others the same compassion we would like to receive if we were involved in the same situation. There is no more important thing in life than to show compassion for a fellow human being.

The Scrutinies are one of the final steps in preparation for those to be initiated. Since Baptism is a “new birth,” it offers a chance to begin life anew, from that time on. All that was done in the past can be past. All sins forgiven. All areas of life that are not in order can be evaluated. Let us use this last stretch of Lent ourselves to let the past be past, to seek forgiveness and reconciliation, to be able to enter into Holy Week and the great Triduum (the “three days” of Holy Thursday, Good Friday and Easter Vigil) fully open to sharing Christ’s life, death, and resurrection.

***Sacrament of Reconciliation**

We will have two opportunities this coming week to celebrate the sacrament of Reconciliation in a communal context. Fr. Ron, myself and a couple of other priests will be at these services to give people an opportunity for individual confession and absolution, after we prepare together communally by reflecting on our need for God’s mercy and the areas of our life we need to surrender over to God or seek forgiveness for. Please join us for either the Wednesday evening celebration, March 28, at 7 p.m. or the Saturday afternoon celebration, March 31, at 3 p.m.

G.R.A.C.E. II

Remember that our next sessions of G.R.A.C.E. take place the week of April 22nd. This time, since we’ve added a Friday night option, it looks like you can sign up for any of the nights—Sunday, Tuesday, Wednesday or Friday. We do ask that families with high school and junior high children try for Sunday (Friday as an alternative) and only Wednesday will have a session for 4 and 5 year olds. Once again, G.R.A.C.E. includes a meal at the beginning. We start right on the hour and ask that people try to be there for the start. The meal isn’t an afterthought. It is part of the whole formation and community building process. The cost of the meal for the children is covered by their yearly fee. For adults and senior high teens we ask, if possible, that you give a donation of \$3 to cover the cost.

The menu this time will include pizza, salad and cookies.

The catechetical focus is on Mary and the Catholic understanding of Mary. The parish event is the May 8th Rite of Crowning an Image of the Blessed Virgin and the praying of the rosary. It will be interesting to look at the passages in the gospels that refer to Mary and see what we can learn there. How and why did the Church grow in its celebration of various feast days for Mary? What does the Church actually teach and believe about the immaculate conception, the assumption and other doctrines concerning Mary? What is your own experience of praying the rosary or including Mary and the saints in your prayer? These and other questions will be explored, appropriate to various age levels as well as in the large group setting.

We need your registration form so we can plan numbers. This is our second learning experience connected to G.R.A.C.E. We learned a lot from the March one and expect to learn as much from this one. Remember, G.R.A.C.E. is for the whole parish, not just those with children. But for those with children, at least one parent/grandparent must attend, though all are encouraged to join us. After the April sessions we will put together a calendar and formation schedule for the next year so that families and individuals can register for a specific evening. The eight G.R.A.C.E. sessions will form the core for all age groups. It is not optional. For children, attendance is taken, since it can effect their involvement in our sacramental programs. But G.R.A.C.E. is the core, not the sole formation times for everyone. These monthly sessions will be supplemented by other gatherings for specific groups and ages throughout the year. For example, all sacramental prep will require a series of meetings both with the parents but also at times separately with the children. Teens will continue to meet on some non-G.R.A.C.E. Sundays, and we will develop something similar for the junior high students apart from the parents.

Help us form and plan this new approach to parish wide, intergenerational, whole community catechesis. Join us for one of the April G.R.A.C.E. sessions.

Palm Sunday (April 1): Masses with procession, palms blessed and distributed—Saturday 5 p.m. and Sunday 8 a.m., 9:30 a.m., 11:30 a.m.

Holy Thursday (April 5): 7 p.m. Mass of the Lord’s Supper with washing of feet and Eucharistic procession; Church open for personal prayer till midnight.

Good Friday (April 6): 1 p.m. Liturgy of the Lord’s Passion with reading of the passion, Veneration of the Cross, and Communion; for those in church at 12 noon there will be a meditation on the Stations of the Cross; for those who can’t make the 1 p.m. Liturgy the Church will remain open for veneration of the cross and prayer (in the Disciples’ Room) till 6 p.m.

Holy Saturday Easter Vigil (April 7): 8 p.m. Mass of the great Easter Vigil; the central celebration of the entire Church year, with lighting of the new fire, vigil of readings, celebration of the sacraments of initiation (Baptism, Confirmation and Eucharist).

Easter Sunday (April 8): Easter Masses at 8 a.m., 9:30 a.m., and 11:30 a.m.

***MCREST**

You will be hearing a lot about our hosting of MCREST in December. We need to get a number of committees underway early. Thankfully Mimi Gendreau has taken on the overall coordinating task. She has a number of committees and leaders in place. But still needs more help. Please pay attention to the Bulletin for information on MCREST. Even if you don’t want to head up a committee we will need lots of volunteers for small tasks throughout the week.

I am excited we are undertaking MCREST. Along with our G.R.A.C.E. formation initiative and the possibility of moving toward a permanent Activities Center, MCREST will stretch us a parish both in terms of resources, space, and finances. Such stretching is good, even if difficult. It will help us grow stronger and more vibrant for the future.

***Conversion and the Stations of the Cross**

What is God inviting us to say "yes" to in our lives? What needs to change? What do we need to let go of? As we continue our Lenten journey of conversion, as well as our focus which came from our March G.R.A.C.E. session, I invite you this week to reflect on station #3 this week—Jesus falls for the first time. Place yourself with Jesus and what he might have been experiencing as he carried that heavy crossbeam along the way. What gave him the strength to get up and carry on? Place yourself under the cross and reflect on what causes you to stumble and fall. Where are our weaknesses and failings and how can we acknowledge them and turn them over to the Lord? Place yourself in the crowd and what they might have been thinking as they watched him. Were some mocking him—and where do we mock or dismiss or negate people in our own lives? Were some agonizing with him but remaining silent—and where do we see wrongdoing happen and sympathize but are afraid to speak up? Did some turn aside or walk away in shame—and what in our lives are we ashamed of?

We will celebrate the stations as a parish community a few more times this Lenten season. On **Monday and Tuesday at 4:45 p.m. and Tuesday at 6:30 p.m.** our religious formation classes will take part in the Stations of the Cross. All are welcome. Then on **Good Friday at 12 noon** our teens will lead us in a meditation on the Stations.
