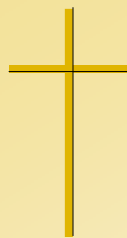

Christian Service

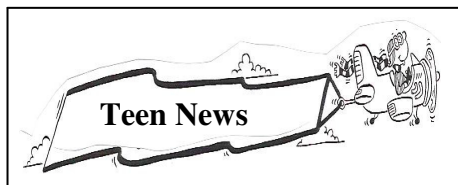

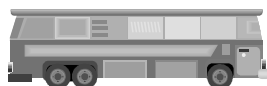

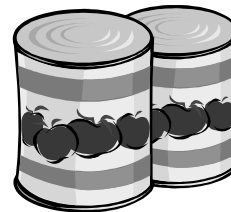

Pastor's Perspective



*Pentecost Sunday

“Come, Holy Spirit, and renew the face of the earth.” We pray to the Holy Spirit to inspire us, guide us, sustain us, give us wisdom, understanding, right judgment, courage, any and all the gifts of the Spirit. Easter season is not complete until we recognize that Christ’s life, death and resurrection is not just about Jesus and his mission. It is now about us and the mission we share with the risen Lord. We are not able to live that mission except with the help of God’s Spirit and so we pray “Come, Holy Spirit.”

The Holy Spirit has been traditionally “described” (although we know we can’t define God) as the bond of love between Father and Son. The Spirit continually pours forth from them so that when that love overflows into and emerges within creation, the Holy Spirit is experienced as the active, personal presence of God’s love in the created world as well. In many ways, though a bit simplistic, one could say that the Holy Spirit is how we experience God when our lives bring forth authentic truth, true goodness, and creative beauty.

On this Pentecost Sunday we once again pray for that Spirit to be poured forth in us and through us. We know that without that Spirit we will not be able to make happen in our lives the kind of truth, beauty and goodness which is authentically of God. “Come, Holy Spirit, fill the hearts of your faithful; enkindle in them the fire of your love. Send forth your Spirit, O God, that we may be re-created and you may renew the face of the earth.”

*Memorial Day

In the midst of our current Iraq war we continue to experience the tragic losses of life. Please join us for the Memorial Day Mass this Monday at 9 a.m. We will remember all who have died in the service of their country in this and any other war. We will pray as well for all who are in the military at the current time. And we will remember all the dead whose name and memory you bring to this time of prayer.

*Why Do We Baptize Infants?

Over the last three weeks I’ve been writing about the implications of dropping “limbo” from our theological landscape. Though never a doctrine of the Church, and thus never of essential significance, such a shift does highlight the difficult struggle to re-think some of the core realities of our Catholic faith in a way that is faithful to our Catholic tradition but open to new understanding. One such reality is the question of why baptize infants. For centuries it was just assumed that one baptizes an infant as soon as reasonable after the birth, lest they tragically die without that gift of baptism, which frees them from “original sin”. Without baptism they could not come to heaven, it was thought. Who would want to risk that fate? We see such a belief even today in some parents (and especially grandparents!) who insist on baptism, even though there is no intention on the part of the parents to raise the child consistently in the faith of the Church.

But notice how magical baptism becomes under that understanding. Rather than being about the rest of our lives—the whole journey of Christian living—baptism gets focused on a moment, as though that guarantees salvation. No! Baptism does not guarantee salvation. But it is the way of salvation. Baptism unites a person to the pattern of Christ’s life, death and resurrection, thereby giving them a way to face sin and evil throughout their lives, and to grow in virtue and grace throughout their lives. Baptism makes a person a member of the body of Christ, the Church, and gives them membership in that ongoing community of salvation.

Baptism permanently “marks” a person in a spiritual sense; not simply as free from original sin, but as a Christ-connected and Christ-claimed person.

Why baptize infants then? Because it is the fullest, deepest way to live human life. If you knew that certain foods would harm your child and certain foods would give them full health, which foods would you feed them? If you knew ways of teaching your child that led them to knowledge that makes all the difference in the world to their future, would you deliberately withhold such teaching? No, of course not. So, we baptize infants because the baptized life, lived faithfully, is the way to salvation, the way to fullness of life.

The Church, then, encourages parents to baptize infants and to do so as soon as it is reasonable. But we no longer are hyper about whether it was in the first or second month after birth. It is commendable to baptize early, but only if at least one parent is ready to publicly take on the responsibility of living and sharing the Catholic faith with the child. If both parents choose not to take on that responsibility, then the Church invites such parents to prayerful consideration of their Catholic faith. During that time baptism is delayed temporarily. What if the parents never come to such an acceptance of their responsibility? Then, with the permission of the parents, the Church will work with the child and other responsible adults (grandparents? aunts? uncles) once they are old enough to actively participate in the process themselves. Or, when they reach young adulthood, the Church will work directly with them. But, again, the key will be the realistic ability to follow through on living the Catholic faith, which includes weekly Eucharist, daily prayer, and so forth. Baptism is never an ending. It is always only the beginning of a new life in Christ.

For several centuries it seems that most people entered into the Catholic faith as adults. However, when the head of a household became Christian, then often the whole household joined as well, children and infants included. We see in some of the

early theologians of the Church a debate over whether such children and infants should be baptized, since they have not committed any personal sin. But clearly it became a more common practice, especially once the majority of the Roman empire became Christian in the second half of the 4th century.

It was also quite common, however, to enroll children as catechumens in the Church but not baptize them. Then, once they were of adult age and some of the “wanderings” of youth had been overcome, they would approach the Church for baptism. Interestingly, this was the path taken by Augustine, even though he would be the theologian most responsible for encouraging the nearly universal practice of baptizing infants as soon as possible.

Personally, I think it is an excellent practice to baptize infants. Not in a superstitious, magical manner. Not in fear of a “what if?” kind of question. Rather, because we have faith and want our children to be surrounded by, marked by and live within that faith. On the other hand, it makes no sense to me to baptize just so that someone is baptized. I do not think God deprives anyone of salvation just because they are not baptized. Like the International Theological Commission that wrote about why the concept of limbo is not persuasive to them, I have a firm hope that such people who die are in the hands of a loving God who wants all to experience salvation. Only our own free rejection of that loving gift of salvation can stop us from it.

What then should we do, about baptizing infants? Baptize them as soon as reasonable, if one or both parents are ready for that public commitment. What if we are not ready to accept the responsibility of raising children in the Catholic faith but do want them to be connected to the Church? I invite you to bring the child to the Church, work with the parish on what faith and baptism involves, and, in the meantime, let them be blessed and marked by the oil of catechumens. If at any time after that one of the parents is ready to commit to the responsibility of raising the child

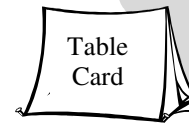
Catholic, then baptism can ensue. Or, once they are old enough to participate on their own, with the parents’ permission and the support of a responsible adult, we will prepare them for the sacrament of baptism.

The necessity of baptism as the “ordinary” way of salvation, then, does not rest on the Augustinian understanding of original sin. Rather, it rests on the firm faith that Jesus Christ formed a community of disciples, the Church, as the sacramental sign of his risen Body. We see baptism as essential for salvation because the baptized life is the path of salvation, whether one knows it consciously or not. The kind of life that leads to salvation—whether lived by a baptized Christian or by someone who is not baptized—will always show a clear affinity to the kind of humanity revealed to us in Jesus’ life, death and resurrection.

This, then, raises a further question to explore in Christian anthropology. If we have hope that infants who are not baptized still experience the fullness of salvation in God, then what about adults who are not baptized? Specifically, what about other faiths? Why not all religions as equal paths to salvation? Why have so many theological disagreements with Muslims, Hindus, and others? More next time.

May you experience both the need for and the presence of the Holy Spirit this week, bringing forth in you a deeper experience of truth, a stronger commitment to goodness, a fuller appreciation of beauty.

Today’s feast of Pentecost celebrates the sending of the Spirit upon the church. In today’s gospel we see the transformation in the apostles from frightened disciples gathered in fear behind locked doors to disciples filled with joy as they begin their apostolic witness to the world.

At the heart of this change is the presence of the risen Lord, the command to go forth, and the giving of the Spirit. In a gesture that recalls God’s act of creation, Jesus gives the Spirit by the action of breathing on the disciples. His imparting of the Spirit is from his own wounded and risen body.

Changes to Meijer Community Rewards
