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**Human Rights Squares**

Catholic Social teaching tells us that God has bestowed on all human beings certain rights that are grounded in the nature and dignity of the human person and that society has a duty to secure and protect these rights. Any denial of a person's rights to life, food, clothing, shelter, rest, medical care and basic education, plus the freedom of speech, worship, and assembly harms persons and wounds the human community.

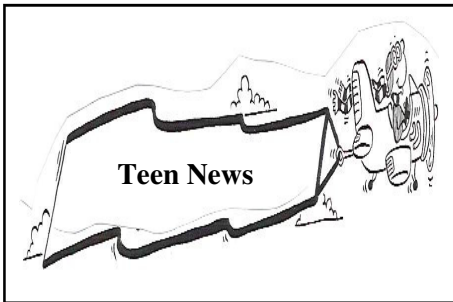

## 2007 Sharing Tree Recipients

Our annual Sharing Tree will be going up on Saturday, November 10 for three weekends with tags from ten different charities from which to choose. Listed below is a brief description of each.

- **AIDS Ministry** — Forum of the Archdiocese of Detroit provides education, caring support and resources to encourage and assist the Catholic community in developing their ministry to people infected and affected by HIV/AIDS.
- **Capuchin Caps, Coats-N-Kids** — This program provides caps, coats and gloves to 400 at risk families, providing warm winter coats to 1,200 children. Parents will have a chance to pick a coat, hat and a pair of gloves for their child(ren) from a selection of new products provided by donors.
- **Our Lady of Guadalupe Mission** — is an Hispanic ministry in Port Huron. Each year the mission provides a Christmas party and allows the children to choose a gift and enjoy a simple meal prepared by community volunteers.
- **St. Maximillian/St. Francis Outreach** — seeks to serve those who come to their church seeking assistance with food, clothing and gifts at Christmas and year round.
- **The Samaritan House** — is a community service organization devoted to serving individuals and families within our community in need of emergency food, utilities and/or rent.
- **Juan Diego Hispanic Ministry** — is a cooperative Hispanic ministry of North Macomb Vicariate, of which SS. John & Paul is a member. It is headquartered in the Agape Center on the grounds of St. Clement in Romeo. Some areas in which help is provided for Hispanics are legal and health matters, translation, religious education for children and English as a Second Language classes.
- **Turning Point** — is a shelter which provides programs and resources that enable victims/survivors of domestic violence, sexual assault and homelessness to regain control of their lives.
- **McWarm of St. Margaret** — offers the homeless in the area of St. Clair Shores a warming center where they can shower and have a lunch of soup and sandwiches Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays beginning November 1 throughout the winter months.
- **Birthright of Macomb Co.** — is a crisis pregnancy center whose mission is to offer guidance, support and aid to the women of Macomb County to help them continue their pregnancies to term.
- **MCREST** — The red tags for MCREST request items needed to provide for the homeless guests that we will be hosting in December. The requested items include non-perishable food, gift cards and other items needed to host our guests. The MCREST tags have special instructions inside the red envelope. It's about an equitable and "fair" partnership between consumers and the farmers who grow the coffee beans. The driving force behind the Fair Trade Coffee movement is to ensure the vast majority of the world's coffee farmers get a fair price for their harvests in order to achieve a decent living wage. Fair Trade guarantees, no matter the market value, a stable and consistent income and much needed credit at fair prices. This decent living wage upholds the dignity of the farmers by enabling them to provide health care, education and economic independence for their families.

# Pastor's Perspective

## \*The Foundational Principle: The Intrinsic, Inalienable, and Inviolable Dignity of Every Human Person

Catholic social teaching, indeed all Catholic moral teaching of any sort, is grounded on this principle: the human person and his or her dignity. It is intrinsic—no matter the age, gifts, ability, background, every person has the same foundational dignity. It is inalienable—no matter what a person does or does not do, even if sinful and harmful, that dignity is not forfeited. It is inviolable—no good intention, no hope for a greater good allows us to deliberately and intentionally violate that dignity. Over the last few decades, especially under Pope John Paul II this principle has been raised to the level of a doctrine. It transcends culture and historical eras. It is essential to the very gospel we teach and believe in.

## \*The Human Person Considered in All His/Her Aspects

What aspects need to be considered or protected in order that the full dignity of the human person is honored? If you read the Compendium of the Social Doctrine of the Church (#124 ff) you find a good example of just what constitutes an integral and adequate understanding of the human person. The list is not meant to be exhaustive but rather to suggest the many dimensions that make us fully human. Each of these aspects needs to be cared for and attended to, not just for the many, but for everyone. All these aspects are in one way or another grounded in the Scriptural reality that we are all made *imago dei*: in the image and likeness of God.

- ◆ *Unity of Body and Soul*: which means both the material and spiritual dimensions of the human person must be attended to and protected. We need to protect and promote each person's nature as a person open to transcendence as well as provide for basic needs of sustenance at all levels.
- ◆ *Unique/Unrepeatable*: every person is a unique creation, irreplaceable. When we seek the common good of society we cannot lose sight of this characteristic so that we don't

trample over certain persons in our pursuit of social goods.

- ◆ *Basic/Intrinsic Good*: which means that we are never morally allowed to treat someone merely as a means to an end; every person, no matter their age or ability, is a basic good whose dignity must be honored.
- ◆ *Core Freedom*: No matter our limitations we have a core freedom that makes us human and to exercise that freedom and have that freedom respected is intrinsic to human dignity.
- ◆ *Intrinsically Social and Relational*: which means that we are not first individuals who then "decide" to form a social fabric; No, we become the persons we are in and through our social, economic, and cultural relationships; to honor the intrinsic dignity of human beings we must provide for adequate networks and participation in the socio-economic-cultural fabric of society.
- ◆ *Created beings within Creation*: We have a huge responsibility to share in the ongoing unfolding of creation, as creatures who are conscious of who we are and what we are capable of. But we still need to honor the good of the environment and the ecology around us, if we are to preserve true human dignity. We are stewards not masters of creation.
- ◆ *Historically-Situated*: We are on a journey, never complete in our lifetime, with limitations imposed on us by our cultural, genetic, and personal histories. We can't do everything or make everything right, so we need to attend to what priorities need to be focused on in each particular situation. Our choices will always involve a prudential decision of weighing harms and benefits. For that reason, this foundational principle needs to be implemented by following various supplemental principles that form the rest of Catholic social doctrine. An insert in today's bulletin lists these as well.

## \*Catholic Campaign for Human Development

Each year we take up this collection in all parishes across the United States. Monies collected go into a fund that provides grants to community

development projects that exhibit a commitment to the fundamental dignity of every human person, especially those who are at the margins of society. As a grant, it means that the recipients must try to find additional funds to cover the cost of the project and only have a limited period in which to rely on the monies from this collection. The idea is to provide seed money for worthy human development projects that need help getting started. With that money groups often can find matching grants and further donors. 80% of the money is set aside for grants from across the nation. 20% remains with the Archdiocese of Detroit for use toward local projects (although local projects can also apply for the national grant money as well).

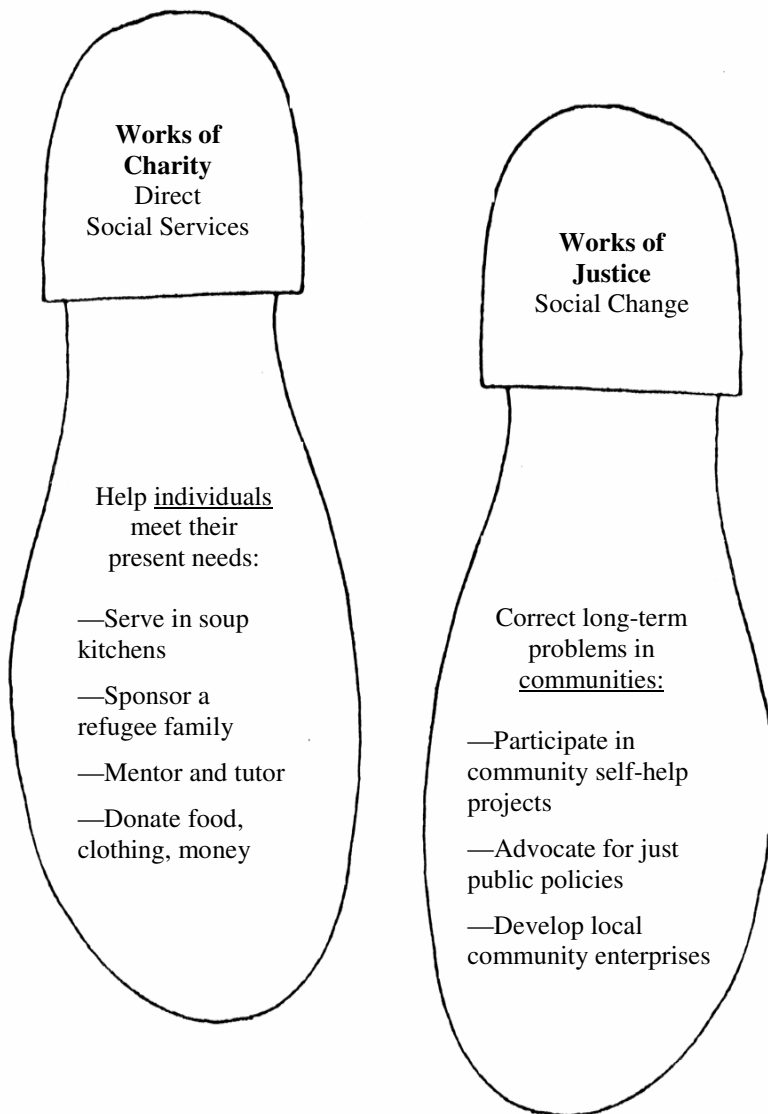
This campaign was started as a Catholic commitment to be partners in making the social structures in the United States more open to justice, especially to those with the least access to resources. It has been an excellent and concrete witness to the foundational principle of human dignity. Please be generous and return any money next week in the envelope marked CCHD.

## \*Quote:

*"The Church sees in men and women, in every person, the living image of God himself. This image finds, and must always find anew, an ever deeper and fuller unfolding of itself in the mystery of Christ, the Perfect Image of God, the One who reveals God to the human person and the human person to himself/herself. It is to these men and women, who have received an incomparable and inalienable dignity from God himself, that the Church speaks, rendering to them the highest and most singular service, constantly reminding them of their lofty vocation so that they may always be mindful of it and worthy of it. Christ, the Son of God, by his incarnation has united himself in some fashion with every person."* [Compendium of Catholic Social Doctrine, #105].

May we make this foundational principle to all Catholic moral teaching essential to our own attitudes and practices. Join us for November monthly G.R.A.C.E. sessions.
