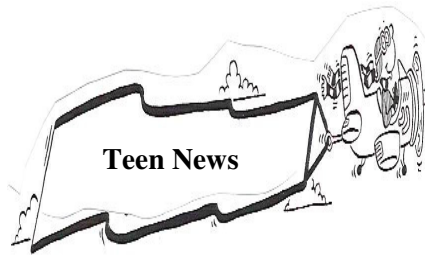

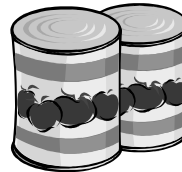
A Note of Thanks

Pastor's Perspective

*Advent

This weekend we end the Church's liturgical year by celebrating the feast of Christ the King: a reminder that all true authority ultimately comes from God and must be exercised responsibly. Then we begin the Advent season the following week (December 1/2). In preparation for Advent please consider being part of the opening procession, carrying in the Advent candle(s) and banners which will mark each Sunday of Advent. A sign-up sheet is on the board in the hallway.

*Advent Mailing

Every parish household should receive a mailing from the parish office sometime this week. Please look over all the items and mark the ones that are important to you on your home calendar. I would like to call attention particularly to the following:

Advent Coffee House Friday November 30th 7-8:30 PM

For men and women (and older teens if they want) to enjoy a coffee house atmosphere as we reflect on and discuss some of the key images and figures in the season of Advent. Come and learn. Come and share. Come and enjoy a good cup of coffee (or tea).

Day of Adoration December 7th

I would like to offer a day of adoration and prayer during the Advent season, like we do during Lent. Join us for Mass at 9 AM or sign up on the bulletin board for a prayer time throughout the day. It ends with Benediction at 6:30 PM. For those who wish to stay, a Mass for the Immaculate Conception follows.

Several priests will be present to assist each evening. A chance to celebrate individual confession in a more communal manner. Families of first Reconciliation candidates will be joining us as well.

***Parish Financial Procedures (continued)**

Last week I went through the change in parish status from being part of the total diocesan "corporation sole" to being a separately incorporated parish. You can read that by going to our website at www.ssjohnandpaul.org and clicking on "Sunday Bulletin" and then on November 18. This week I want to conclude by mentioning many of the internal financial controls which are in place at the parish to ensure that money donated to the parish is properly accounted for.

Our yearly budget is prepared with the help of the business manager and the budget and finance committee of the Stewardship commission and reviewed by the full Stewardship commission. All budgets must be balanced. It is then submitted to the parish pastoral council for approval. Once approved, it is signed by me as pastor and by the president of the parish council and sent to the archdiocese. The archdiocese reviews the budget and all

requested capital expenditures related to the budget and then approves the budget, if it is in order. At the end of the fiscal year, we submit a financial report to the archdiocese, signed by the pastor and the president of the parish council, which tracks the flow of all income and all expenses. As an added control, the Budget and Finance Committee (a sub-committee of the Stewardship Commission) reviews the monthly financial reports. They have access to all financial transactions that take place— income, expenses, salaries, employee benefits and so forth.

How are outflows handled? To begin with, I review and sign over 99% of the checks that go out from the parish. The only other person who is able to sign checks is our pastoral associate, JoAnne Owens, and she does so only when I am out of town. Our employees are required to submit signed check requests, along with appropriate documentation, to get checks issued from our Business Manager, Paula Klozik. Our business manager reviews the paperwork, processes the check and the check request and the check is submitted for my review before I sign the check. I also am the one who first opens the bank statements monthly, to review all the returned checks in order to make sure that there is no check that has been processed without my knowledge. I then initial the statement and forward the canceled checks and bank statement to our business manager to reconcile.

How do we handle money that comes into the office during the week or into the parish on a weekend? On the weekends we have teams of volunteer money counters that count the weekly offertory. The teams consist of five to six people, and they count every four weeks or so. They are not allowed to count money until at least three people are in the counting room. They count each Mass separately and sign the counting sheet when finished. This allows us to look for patterns or changes in patterns of counting. At the end of the weekly counting the money counters night deposit the money at our banking institution.

Any money that is collected outside of the weekly offertory is

recorded on a daily collection report by our parish secretary, Mary Ann LaRaia, and put in the safe, where it will get recounted before it is deposited into the bank. These reports are forwarded to the business manager so she can reconcile the monthly bank statement. Everything is overseen and reconciled by our business manager. But she cannot sign any checks, nor does she count or prepare money deposits for the bank.

Where do we stand financially? All our bills are paid weekly and there are no outstanding debts, except the loan we have with the Archdiocese for the property on the north side of our grounds. This is a zero-interest loan and so has no current impact on our finances. The payroll taxes and insurances are paid in full and on time. The parish follows all the policies and procedures of the Archdiocese. The results of the fall 2002 Archdiocesan audit state: "The books of account were found to be in balance and in good order". What about our buildings and grounds? Every year a subcommittee of the Stewardship Commission walks through all buildings and checks for needed maintenance items, which are then put into the following year's budget. In addition, all property is catalogued and videotaped for insurance purposes.

Recently the Archdiocese told the parishes that an audit would be done every three years. In the past an audit was done when the pastor was changed or at the request of the parish council. Because many parishes have long-serving pastors, the decision has been made to do an audit every three years. Our last audit was in 2002, when I became pastor. This past month I asked our budget and finance committee to consider a yearly audit. The diocese will do theirs every three years, but I wanted to budget money for an annual audit. After some discussion they recommended that we do a partial audit every six months to test that proper controls remain in place and to review a portion of the financial transactions during the past six months. I gave them the go ahead to do so. We have on that committee people with C.P.A. experience and they have access to others, if needed. Beginning in 2008 they will oversee a partial audit every six months.

In summary, I take the responsibility as the primary steward of the parish's monies very seriously, and as a result am very "hands-on" in the administration of sound business and accounting practices. In addition, SS. John and Paul has an exemplary staff, an active Parish Council, and several supporting Commissions and Committees that directly or indirectly monitor the activities within the parish to ensure that budgets are adhered to and that all monies are properly accounted for. If you have any concerns or questions, please let me know or contact Paula Klozik, our business manager, directly. ***The Golden Compass?**

There has been a lot of publicity on the upcoming release of the movie "The Golden Compass." It is a fantasy movie, aimed at children and adults who like such movies as Harry Potter and The Lord of the Rings. It is based on the first book of a trilogy written by Phillip Pullman (published in Great Britain as "The Northern Lights" and in the U.S. under the "Golden Compass" title). Many of your children might have been encouraged to read it already, due to the fact that Scholastic put out reading aids and guidelines for teachers to use. But there is a problem I want to call your attention to. The author of that trilogy wrote it deliberately to encourage an anti-Christian, especially an anti-Catholic attitude. In the first book he caricatures the Catholic Church and depicts it as the real source of evil in the world. By the third book he turns God into a decrepit, useless authority who needs to be gotten rid of. It is one thing for adults to read such fantasy/fiction. It is another to aim it at middle school age children as well.

William Donahue, the president of the Catholic League for Religious and Civil Rights wrote a letter to Scholastic which said in part: "*As someone who spent 20 years in education, I am aware of Scholastic's stellar reputation. This is all the more reason why I am profoundly disturbed by Scholastic's role in co-producing "The Golden Compass." It is not the movie, per se, that is the*

problem, it is the book—and the other volumes that comprise His Dark Materials—that is the issue. The author of these books, Philip Pullman, does not disguise his hatred of Christianity, especially the Roman Catholic Church. Why, then, would Scholastic be associated with such bigotry? As pointed out in our booklet on "The Golden Compass," producing such a movie would seem to violate Scholastic's own Credo, one part of which says, "To help build a society free of prejudice and hate, and dedicated to the highest quality of life in community and nation." Moreover, Scholastic professes a belief in "High moral and spiritual values," something which surely sounds odd given the Pullman connection."

The movie company argues that they have toned down the anti-religious component of the book and have turned the main "bad guys" into a symbol of any excessive dogmatic authority that runs amok, not specifically the Church. Plus, they are using Nicole Kidman, a practicing Catholic and one of the stars of the movie, as a way to argue that it couldn't possibly be anti-Catholic, because she would never be involved in such a thing.

All that remains to be seen. But parents should at least be aware that the author of the books has a decided interest in trying to encourage an atheistic approach to life. He deliberately modeled some of the externals of his books on C.S. Lewis' *The Narnia Chronicles* (use of children to bring out ultimate choices that affect the fate of everyone, religious allegories, parallel worlds, even beginning his book with a young girl in a wardrobe just as C.S. Lewis did), in order to entice those who liked those books but in the end to undercut their religious vision.

If you choose to take your children to the movie or if they read the book, just be aware of these issues and, if necessary, point out how some of the author's prejudices affect the portrayal of certain characters or use of certain images and words. I think such occurrences actually provide an opportunity for parents to talk with and be part of the formation of their child's worldview. I do not think, however, that schools should be in the business of promoting it.

♦ Make a Gift through an IRA Charitable Rollover

If you are over the age of 70 1/2, you must take a required minimum distribution from your IRA. Normally the amount of this distribution is taxed as ordinary income. However, federal legislation enacted last year permits you, for the remainder of 2007, to make direct distribution from your IRA to a qualified charity, such as the parish, the Catholic Services Appeal (CSA) or any other charity. Such distributions, while not subject to income tax, will still count toward fulfilling your required minimum distribution.
