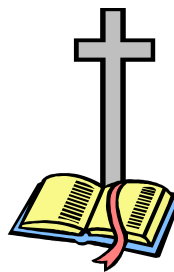

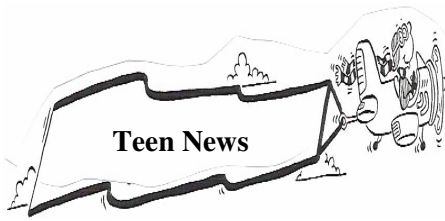

Pastor's Perspective

*Good Shepherd Sunday

Because the gospel reading on the fourth Sunday of Easter comes from the tenth chapter of John, where Jesus uses images of the good shepherd, this Sunday is often called "Good Shepherd Sunday." In the gospel passage this year, Jesus actually compares himself both to the shepherd of the sheep and the gate through which the sheep pass to be kept safe and have abundant life. He makes a contrast between the authentic shepherd who knows his sheep and they know him and the thief who comes to steal and destroy.

That image of the shepherd is reinforced in today's responsorial psalm, the very beautiful Psalm 23 ("The Lord is my shepherd"), and in the second reading from 1 Peter 2:25 ("For you have gone astray like sheep, but you have now returned to the shepherd and guardian of your souls").

The image of Jesus as the Good Shepherd is a very powerful one in Christian symbolism, art and prayer. It captures the sense of Jesus as a caring leader. It connects to the parable image of the shepherd who will search for the one lost sheep, rejoicing more in finding that sheep than in the other ninety nine who have no need of being found. But in John's gospel in particular it calls attention to who God is. Wherever John's gospel uses the "I am" passages, and there are many such places, the gospel is alerting us to how the divine reality of Jesus shines through his humanity. It is giving us an intimate look into the heart of God and who God is for us.

In the Old Testament encounter of Moses with God at the burning bush (Exodus 3:14), Moses asks for the name of the One he is encountering. Instead of a direct answer, which would give a sense of Moses' ability to control how and when he can call upon this God, God says "I am who I am," from which we get the name "Yahweh." God will be who God will be. We don't get to question or control God. God is God and

we are not God. But now in Jesus the Christ this God who is and who will be is shown to be near to us and concerned to be our helper, our strength, our nourishment, and our protector. We still don't get to control or dictate to this God of ours, but we know a bit more who this God is. In Jesus God is the water that will give us life, the light that will overcome any darkness, the bread that will feed our deepest hunger, the way that will lead to salvation, the truth that will set us free, the resurrection and the life that will overcome death, and the good shepherd who will never abandon us and always claim us as his own.

Having been pastor for twelve years at a parish called Christ the Good Shepherd, I've always had a fondness for this fourth Sunday of Easter, often called "Good Shepherd Sunday." The shepherd protects as well as guides. The shepherd is willing to live amongst his sheep so that they will know him and be bonded to him. The shepherd will fight for the life of his sheep against thief and wolf. In what areas of our life is the Lord trying to do some of the above? Where are we resisting him? Let us do some reflection this week.

*Memorizing Psalm 23

Psalm 23 is one of the shorter psalms in the Bible. It is a wonderful one to memorize, and as part of the faith formation program we are asking our students to know it by heart, so they can have that as a permanent prayer in their lives. I invite all of us to do the same. [If you want to see what else we ask our religious ed children to learn, go to the parish website, click on Faith Formation and then explore all the links connected to our G.R.A.C.E. program.] Various translations can be used, but this is the one from the New American Bible with revised New Testament and revised Psalms, from which we take most of our Sunday readings.

The Lord is my shepherd; I shall not want. In verdant pastures he gives me repose; besides restful waters he leads me; he refreshes my soul.

He guides me in right paths for his name's sake. Even though I walk in the dark valley I fear no evil; for you are at my side; with your rod and your staff that give me courage.

You spread the table before me in the sight of my foes; you anoint my head with oil; my cup overflows.

Only goodness and kindness follow me all the days of my life; and I shall dwell in the house of the Lord for years to come.

*Sunday's Second Reading

Although the main focus in the Fourth Sunday of Easter is on Jesus as the good shepherd, we have in our second reading this week—from 1 Peter 2:20-25—a perfect follow up to our G.R.A.C.E. session from last week. The letter of Peter says: "He himself bore our sins in his body upon the cross, so that, free from sin, we might live for righteousness; by his wounds you have been healed." At our G.R.A.C.E. sessions, we looked at how we share in Jesus' healing ministry. And one part of that sharing is the reality of suffering and illness and how we are asked to connect such realities to the redemptive suffering of Christ. It is not an easy question. We have to be careful not to see suffering and illness as directly caused by God. They are part of our being finite and created and imperfect. At the same time, even though sin can cause our spirits to be wounded, which in turn can have physical effects, we need to be careful not to see most physical suffering as somehow caused by our personal sin. That was a fairly common understanding in Jesus' day and continues to be a bit too common today.

Rather we share in the suffering of all humanity, just as Jesus did, no matter the cause, and we proclaim through our lives and actions that such suffering does not get the final word. We show that life can be lived in the midst of it, that forgiveness can happen, that

hope can be maintained, that no one is isolated from our embrace of love, that the world is capable of stopping much suffering though better use of its resources and care for those most in need.

Moreover, we are confronted with the powerful image of the crucified and resurrected Jesus. Yes, he is risen, but his wounds are still visible. We can't know all the reasons for why Jesus presents to the disciples a resurrected body that still shows the wounds. Certainly it was one way to assure them that the Jesus they lived with and saw crucified was now with them in a risen way. But beyond that it suggests that we have to be very careful when we use words such as those from 1 Peter "by his wounds we have been healed." Yes, we have been so healed, but not in a way that removes all our wounds. Like the risen Lord, we still carry the wounds of life and take on the wounds of others, when we work for their well-being. But these wounds are healed because we do not let them lead us to despair, revenge, and other ways of death. Instead we take strength from the risen Lord and find ways to turn such wounds into signs of hope and salvation.

***Pope Benedict's Visit to the United States**

Pope Benedict XVI will be making his first pastoral visit to the United States, beginning this Tuesday. It will be a significant event. He doesn't travel as much as his predecessor Pope John Paul II and it will be in the midst of an election season, the continuing war in Iraq, and the real diversity over the cultural issues that he likes to focus on (relativism, traditional marriage, life issues). He likes to carefully choose his words and so it will be very interesting to see what specific thoughts he concentrates on in his speeches. Some mistakenly think he is not very personable. While he isn't John Paul II, who seemed to soak in the energy of all the people, especially the young people, at his public events, Pope Benedict does have a very peaceful presence in his

public events. Over the next few weeks, I will highlight and offer my own comments on some of the more important speeches he gives during this visit.

I have placed some links on the parish website, which give more detailed coverage of all the papal events. Let us pray for Pope Benedict. Although we do not have to agree with all that he says—his speeches are not formal teachings but his pastoral concerns for the Church and world—as Catholics we do have a special bond, because of the office and ministry of the bishop of Rome. In these public papal events, there is such a clear sense of the oneness of the Church, of its connection to the apostles, and of its universality (the meaning of the word 'catholic'). That is one of the true gifts of being Catholic.

All 4th -7th graders should receive a letter from me, inviting them to become altar servers (or to remain as servers) for the coming year. If your child would like to be trained as an altar server—and we could use a number of new ones—please fill out the form received and return it in the next couple of weeks. The training sessions are scheduled for Sunday April 27 and Saturday May 3 from 12:30 -1:45 PM. Parents, lunch is included (pizza, chips, pop/water).

I would like to continue to see a balance of both boys and girls serving at the altar. The commitment is for one year at a time. Parents, please discuss this with your children and encourage them to be servers. Parents of boys, we especially need a few more to keep the numbers balanced. Thank you.

May the Good Shepherd protect, comfort, and guide you this week.
