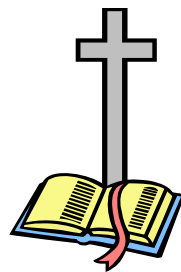

...Meet Al Eppens Director of Liturgical Music

I write this at the request of the Pastoral Council and with some embarrassment, since I do not like to "toot my own horn," although I do love to toot organ pipes. In any case, here is an overview of my life so far.

I was born and raised in Detroit, on the East Side, the youngest of three children (and the only boy). My elementary school years were spent at St. Matthew's School, where in second grade I began singing in the liturgical boys' choir. By fourth grade I began accompanying the choir and playing for some Masses in the parish. I attended Bishop Gallagher High School, during which time I played at Our Lady Queen of Peace Parish under Paul Hotin.

College began at Western Michigan University, where I became organist of the University Chapel, and earned a Bachelor of Arts degree in history through the Honors College, going on by a University Fellowship to a Master of Arts degree. My curriculum was extremely broad, with a specialty in Medieval history, particularly the twelfth through the fourteenth centuries, although my honors paper was on music of the Reformation Period.

From there I engaged in a detour to The University of Michigan Law School, which I chose mainly for its excellent Jacobean Gothic architecture. Completing law school and passing the Bar Exam obligated me to practice law, which I did in a variety of contexts. For several years I was with a medium-sized law firm in Dearborn Michigan, doing trial work representing hospitals and health care professionals in medical cases, and becoming managing partner. From there I moved to downtown Detroit, with the firm of Riley & Roumell, where I continued as a trial lawyer, being appointed a Special Assistant Attorney General for the State of Michigan.

During all of that time, I continued with the underlying passions of my life - history and music, continuously teaching part time at the college level and always maintaining a church position. I also found time to marry and to raise three children, who then became the primary passion of my life. Andrew, Eric and Cate are now fine young adults, and we remain extremely close, even though Eric is still out-of-state. Around ten years ago I decided to rebalance my life, and to gradually withdraw from the practice of law, which I have been able to completely accomplish.

I continue to pursue academic studies, publishing a few years ago a chapter in a book on religious terrorism, and continuing to research and to teach. I have also continued to grow musically, through studies at Sacred Heart Seminary and elsewhere. I am currently seven credits from completing my Bachelor of Philosophy degree at Sacred Heart.

Obviously, I am a person who needs to be kept busy, with multiple vocations creating balance (though not stability) in my life, since they are always changing. I engage in running to keep fit and to reduce stress, and enjoy retreating to the small-town life of downtown New Baltimore. I certainly look forward to new adventures during the coming decades.

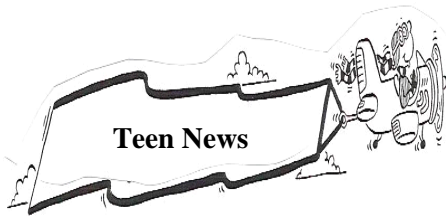

On behalf of Macomb County Community Services Agency's Senior Citizen Nutrition Program, please allow me this opportunity to thank you for your generous monetary donation of \$200.00 to our Meals on Wheels Program in support of our fourth annual March for Meals campaign.

Habitat Myths and Facts

SS. John & Paul will be partnering with other area churches and Macomb Habitat for Humanity in their "Faith Build" house scheduled to be built this summer. In an effort to clear up some common misconceptions about Habitat, we will be publishing some myths and facts in this bulletin and in the coming weeks.

Myth: *Habitat for Humanity gives houses away to poor people.*

Fact: Habitat for Humanity offers a home ownership opportunity to families unable to obtain conventional house financing—generally, those whose income is 30—50 percent of the area's median income. Prospective Habitat homeowner families in Macomb County make a \$1,000 down payment and contribute 250 hours of "sweat equity" for each adult in the family on the construction of their home or someone else's home. Because Habitat houses are built using donations of land, material and labor, mortgage payments are kept affordable. While some Habitat homeowners receive Aid to Families with Dependent Children (AFDC), many more are working people. Typically their annual income is less than half the local median income in their community.

Pastor's Perspective

*C.S.A.

All parish households will receive later this week or early next week our 2008 Catholic Services Appeal letter, pledge/donation form, and return envelope. Included as well will be a question and answer sheet to dispel some common misunderstandings many people have regarding the C.S.A. The diocese also produced a brochure for this year, which will be in the packet, and it has the breakdown of archdiocesan offices who will be receiving C.S.A. money. One of the key characteristics of being Catholic is that our local parish is never the Church unto itself. We are part of the universal Church and most especially part of that Church as it exists in the Archdiocese of Detroit. Our participation in the C.S.A. is a very necessary part of how that larger Church reality carries out the mission and ministry entrusted to it by the Lord.

Please read the material and once again be generous in your C.S.A. donation/pledge. Every dollar helps the parish reach its mandatory target, which otherwise would need to be taken from other parish funds. And every dollar over the mandatory target comes back to the parish for its own use 100%. We did not have the exact target when preparing the letter, but we now know it will be \$86,485 a very slight reduction from last year.

I still can use a couple of helpers for the initial C.S.A. weeks of May 3/4 and May 10/11. Sign ups are on the board in the hallway to the Activities Center or use the form in this bulletin. Thank you.

*Invalid Baptisms?

Recently the Vatican Congregation of the Faith issued a statement on the wording used for baptisms. It stated that all baptisms which do not use the explicit words "I baptize you in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit"

are invalid, and so someone would need a re-baptism if they knew for certain that happened to them. It was especially focused on baptisms where the words "I baptize you in the name of the Creator, the Redeemer and the Sanctifier" or "Creator, Liberator, and Sustainer" have been used as an alternative naming of the Trinity. What is going on here?

I don't personally know of any priests or deacons who have deliberately used improper formulas and so one should not get overly concerned. But it does seem that some priests and other Christian ministers have at times changed the words in order to de-emphasize the male imagery of God and accentuate a more gender-neutral imagery. The Congregation of the Faith is reminding priests and others that such changes are not in accord with our tradition and so are not to be done, for several reasons. The first is that the most ancient baptismal formulas we have explicitly invoke the name of God in Trinitarian terms as "Father, Son, and Holy Spirit." Although such formulas are not absolute, the Church tries to honor them as much as possible.

Secondly, baptism is not simply an individual or family or cultural reality. It is not up to the priest or minister, individual or family, to make up a "better" sacrament on his/her own, even if the intention is a good one. Again, it doesn't mean that there is only one set way of baptizing. Rather, it means that if the traditional form is not going to be used, then one is risking missing an essential aspect of the sacramental words/gestures.

That is why the Church is so "conservative" of its sacramental traditions. The Vatican is very emphatic about what is used as the bread and wine at the Eucharist or as the oil at the Anointing of the Sick. It is very careful about the wording of the vows that couples make at the time of marriage (no making up one's own vows, no matter how lovely they might sound!). These are sacraments of the Church, entrusted to the Church by Jesus so that he can form us as his

people through celebrating these sacraments and so that we can be faithful to the essential aspects of his mission and ministry in this world. Yes, words and forms can and do change over the centuries, but almost always the Church is very cautious in doing so, lest we alter key aspects of what these sacraments are doing.

Thirdly, the mistake that was made by those substituting these particular words in the baptismal formula is that "Creator, Redeemer, and Sanctifier" or "Creator, Liberator, and Sustainer," though sounding like synonyms for the persons of the Trinity, are not. In our Christian tradition the whole Triune God—Father, Son and Spirit—is Creator, Redeemer, Sanctifier, Liberator and Sustainer, and so those names can be used of each or all three persons. The Vatican was reminding us that to change to these particular words is the same as using as saying "I baptize you in the name of God, and of God, and of God." This misses the particular roles the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit play in bringing us salvation.

As to the Vatican's remedy—that all who know they have been invalidly baptized are to be rebaptized—we have to interpret such rules in the proper manner. According to church law we are to interpret such guidelines as narrowly as possible, giving the maximum allowable freedom to the Christian people. Because almost no one can remember the exact words used at a particular baptism, the presumption is that all baptisms were valid, unless it can be explicitly shown otherwise. We do not want scrupulous people worrying over nothing.

Also, there is a danger that we could focus especially on non-Catholic Christian baptisms from certain "liberal" denominations and think there is something suspect about those baptisms, when we have spent decades appreciating the importance of recognizing the baptisms of all other Christians, when possible. Moreover, the Church has long accepted the validity of baptism, even if not done

by the proper form, when the one doing the baptism is trying to do “what the Church means by baptism.” There is a very old norm in Church practice that *ecclesia supplet* (“The Church supplies”) in the sense that the faith of the Church covers for or makes up for any well-intentioned mistakes, in the course of celebrating sacraments. Even if someone used those improper words, if their intention was to baptize in the name of the Triune God (which would almost certainly be the case for all Christian ministers), it would be presumed valid. It would be scandalous to begin re-baptizing simply out of a fear that an improper formula might have been used.

So, in the end, the recent Vatican instruction is really quite limited to those cases where it is positively known that the priest/ minister used an invalid formula and had the intention of changing the formula as something different from what the Church means by the Trinity. In other words, very, very, very limited application to past abuses. Instead, it serves primarily as a reminder of the need for priests/ ministers to be very careful of substituting personal beliefs for the Tradition of the Church, and so serves as a guide for future baptisms, if someone was prone to use a different formula.

I will put a link to the Vatican document on our parish website, in case someone wants to look at that document. But remember: There is a very nuanced way to interpret Vatican documents, which is recognized by the Church and those that issues those documents. If we don’t use that method of interpretation we can sometimes misunderstand what they are saying and the limits to their official authority.

***Episcopal Matters**

For the last few years, Bishop Earl Boyea, one of the Archdiocese of Detroit’s auxiliary bishops, has been designated by Cardinal Maida as the regional bishop for our area (generally the northeast suburbs). That meant

that he was the archbishop’s “hands and eyes” for our vicariates, connecting us to the wider mission of the Archdiocese of Detroit. Recently he was appointed as ordinary of the Lansing diocese and will be installed as their bishop in the next week. As a result the other auxiliary bishops’ responsibilities have been shuffled, so that all areas of the diocese are covered.

Bishop Daniel Flores is now our regional auxiliary bishop. Auxiliary bishops share fully in a bishop’s sacramental ministry but they have no day-day authority other than what is given them by the archbishop. Bishop Flores’ responsibilities include as well most of the areas of the diocese which have a strong Hispanic Catholic presence, although he is not simply appointed to oversee Hispanic ministry.

Please pray for Bishop Boyea as he moves to Lansing and assumes his role there. Pray for Bishop Flores who has been given a very large area of responsibility. Pray for Cardinal Maida as well. It is clear from his recent appointments that he is getting himself ready to retire from his role as archbishop. And pray for Pope Benedict, as he decides who the next archbishop of Detroit will be.

In today’s gospel, Jesus assures his disciples that he is going “to prepare a place for them.” When questioned by Thomas he says “I am the way and the truth and the life.” This is another one of those “I AM” passages in the gospel of John which signals we are about to learn something important about our relationship to God, who told Moses “I am who I am.” So, if we want to know the way to God, or authentic truth or full and abundant life, we are to follow where Jesus leads, where he has gone ahead of us. May our Easter faith give us the courage to follow even though the way is at times difficult, the truth is not always what is most comfortable, and the life is filled with its share of crosses.
