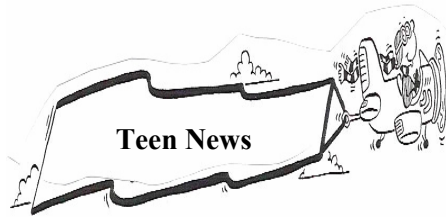

- ◆ Plastic shopping bags take up to 1,000 years to decay.
- ◆ The average family accumulates 60 plastic bags in only four trips to the grocery store.
- ◆ When retailers give away free bags, their costs are passed on to consumers in the form of higher prices. The annual cost to U.S. retailers for plastic shopping bags is estimated at \$4 billion.

Many stores in our area now offer reusable shopping bags at reasonable prices. Some stores even offer incentives for using your own shopping bags and recycling for plastic bags. Next time you go shopping, remember to bring your own bag!!

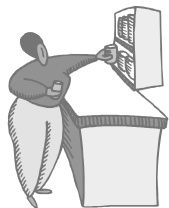

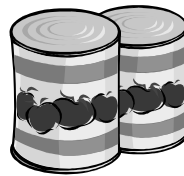

Pastor's Perspective

*New Servers

Any current grade 4-7 student who wants to help us on Sunday as an altar server (we need you!), please come to a training session, either today (Sunday April 27th) or next Saturday (May 3rd) from 12:30 – 1:45 PM. A lunch will be included. Parents are welcome to stay and attend (we'll feed you also!) or drop off/pick up.

*Anointing of the Sick Monday

We spent this April month of G.R.A.C.E. on the healing ministry of Jesus, with a special focus on the sacrament of Anointing of the Sick. Please come and celebrate that sacrament with the community this Monday, April 28 at 7:00 PM. Remember, it is not just for those who are going to be anointed. It is also a connection of the whole community to this sacrament. I especially encourage families who have not experienced this sacrament to be with us this evening.

*Coffee House on Friday

The north Macomb and Central Macomb Vicariates support a combined young adult (post-high school, 18-35 year olds) ministry called "Emmaus-Ministries." There is a link to them on our website. I call your attention to a new venture, a coffee house for young adults. We will test it out **this coming Friday at St. Lawrence, open from 7:00 – 10:00 PM.** Around 8 PM or so I will lead a discussion on Catholic faith and voting in the upcoming elections. The bishops issued a document called "Faithful Citizenship" (a link is on our website). We will take a look at this in general and talk about how young adults connect their Catholic faith and voting. It is **not** a night of lobbying for voting one way or another. Rather, a night of enjoying some coffee/tea, each other's company, and thoughtful discussion on faith and politics.

If enough want to see such a coffee house venture continue, there will

be a more regular gathering beginning in late August. All post-high school young adults, single or married, college students or full-time working, are invited and encouraged to attend.

*Catholic Services Appeal

You already have or shortly will receive a mailing from me about this year's Catholic Services Appeal. Please review the material in the mailing and use the enclosed form and return envelope to make your pledge/donation to the 2008 C.S.A.. The theme this year is "Bridging the Generations," a way to highlight how the monies received service young, old and middle aged alike, in a variety of ways, as well as allow our stewardship to be put toward Catholic Church-sponsored services that maintain outreach for the future. The mailing also contained a brochure that shows the general breakdown of how the money will be spent. I will post a link to that information on the parish website, as well as post it on the board in the hallway.

A few other reminders: 1) The C.S.A. donations are the best way to donate significant money to the parish. All money donated helps us reach our mandatory target and then over that amount comes back to us 100% for parish use. No diocesan "tax" is taken out. 2) If we do extremely well in one year, it does not affect the target for next year. [Notice how well we did last year—about \$170,000 and yet our C.S.A. target went down slightly this year.] 3) Monies go to the designated offices/services. They are not general fund monies. No money is used to support projects like the John Paul II Center in Washington, D.C. nor are any monies used to pay settlements in lawsuits. 4) This is not just another second collection. Sunday financial support is the most important way we keep this parish going. But the C.S.A. is the second most important financial contribution we can make. 5) If we can average at least \$300 per household, we will meet and exceed our target. For some that means giving less than that, because that is all we can afford. For many of us, myself included, it means giving more than that, because we have

the resources. 6) Finally, if you have any questions about the C.S.A., its monies, how it is spent, etc., please ask. I or our business manager or a member of the Stewardship Commission would be happy to address any concerns.

*May Crowning May 14th

On Wednesday May 14th at 6:30 PM we will have our annual Rite of Crowning an Image of the Blessed Virgin, traditionally called a "May Crowning." Since it is not explicitly connected to an evening of religious formation, this will be a bit of a test year. I think it is something worth doing each year as a parish community. But parish members will have to be intentional about coming to it. It is not part of their regularly scheduled religious formation. This is one of the additional family events that form the larger G.R.A.C.E. formation program, as well as a parish-wide prayer event.

It begins at 6:30 and lasts approximately 40 minutes. It includes praying the rosary, litany, intercessions and the placing of a crown of flowers on Mary. We will draw the name of a family present to help with the crowning. The meeting of the parish commissions and parish council follows, so members attending those meetings should see this as part of their meeting prayer. I would love to see a full house of other individuals and families, but I especially encourage our first Eucharist families to attend, with the children dressed in their communion clothes. They will be a special part of our procession.

*G.R.A.C.E.

Next week will be our final monthly G.R.A.C.E. session for the year. We're looking to give it a little different twist with some outdoor grilling (hot dogs—we just bought a large parish grill and will initiate it those nights) and ending with some ice cream dessert. The main focus, though is on faith formation, this time on prayer, particularly how we can develop habits of prayer that can energize our faith. If you have not yet

participated in any of the previous monthly G.R.A.C.E. sessions, pick an evening (Sunday, Tuesday, Wednesday, or Friday) and join us. These sessions are for all adults as well as teens and grade school age children.

It is difficult to characterize the immense amount of work and energy that your parish staff has taken on in order to shift our faith formation experience to an intergenerational, whole community model. The best way to understand it is to participate in both the monthly formation sessions for the whole parish and some of the age or situation specific sessions for particular groups. We have learned a lot during this past year but have grown more and more convinced of the general model we have in place. There will be some tweaks to the specifics based on suggestions/evaluations that have been given.

Go online (www.ssjohnandpaul.org) and read the G.R.A.C.E. booklet and other links that give you a sense of all that has been happening. Registration for next year is in process. There are separate forms for families with children grades 1-8; for the early childhood Sunday program for late 3s through 5 year olds; and for teens, young adults or older adults who attend on their own.

*Elijah Cup

Various families and households have been wonderful and faithful in hosting the Elijah Cup for vocations in their home during the past four months. We still have a number of families who have signed up and we will be getting the cup to you in the weeks ahead. But we would like to see the cup continue as a parish custom well down the road. For that to happen we need households or families to sign up for a week. The binder for that is always available at the back of the church, by the ambry (where the oils are kept). Sign up and a member of the Vocations Committee will contact you to arrange for a week that fits your schedule.

When a family brings up the cup in the procession with the gifts, after

praying with it the week before, I am always so thankful for them. I have a visual sense of placing their hopes for themselves, their children, and all the young people of the parish in that cup as we offer Eucharist that day. I pray that God give each a sense of where he wants them, how he wants to use their gifts and talents. I pray that some are drawn to full-time ministry within the Church, whether as priests, religious, or lay ecclesial ministry.

*Pope Benedict XVI

So what did you think of his visit to the United States and the talks and homilies he gave? I think the pope surprised a lot of people. He balanced an appreciation of the cultural situation of the United States with an emphasis on the need to respect the dignity of all people, including immigrants. He challenged the country to live with God and not drop God out of our lives. He didn't use his visit to polarize Catholics who have a different understanding of the role of faith and politics. He stood at the ground of the 9-11 tragedy and prayed and spoke words of compassion and hope. He attended a synagogue and showed that his oft-repeated focus on the universal significance of Jesus Christ—and that this not be watered down—is not a call to convert Jews but to pray with them as members of God's covenant. All in all, I was very impressed.

At first I was a bit worried, when the pope raised the issue, yet again, of the clergy abuse scandals, not just once but several times in the early days of his visit. But then he did something unexpected and so important. He actually met face-face with five representative people from Boston who had been victimized by priests, and he met with them open and unscripted. This was not just a highly symbolic action (which, of course, it was) but a genuinely new attempt to signal the Church's resolve to be healing rather than divisive on this issue.

Matched with the Vatican's announcement that some new rules were forthcoming in canon law (probably connected to extending the statute of

limitations so that past allegations have more time to come to the light of day), and with Pope Benedict's straightforward statement that the Church will do all it can to make sure no pedophile priests remain in priesthood, a sense of turning a corner was experienced. As one of the five people who met with him on this issue put it so well: we are at the end of the beginning of this issue within the Church. Much, much more needs to be addressed, including the bishops' accountability for moving priests around, but at least a first step in the journey seems to be completed.

Let us pray for our pope and his leadership not just within the Church but on the world stage as well.
