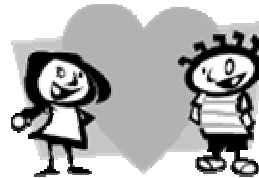

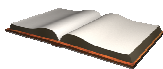

The purpose of the Men's Club is to socialize, play cards, and is open to any other ideas for activities you'd like to see happen.

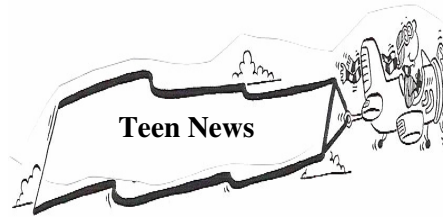

“Back 40” Wildlife

Last month approximately 9,000 square feet of brush was cleared from the original property behind the Parish Center. During this process the landscapers discovered two coyote dens. We contacted the Michigan Department of Natural Resources and were told not to be alarmed, that coyotes are more afraid of us than we are of them! The naturalist advised us to knock down the tunnels to their dens, which will force them to find new homes, probably in another brushy area. Here are a few facts on coyotes: *

- Most coyotes are likely to be seen during breeding season, mid-January through March
- Coyotes are active day and night, with peaks at sunrise and sunset
- Usually feed at night
- Like to eat small mammals, like mice, rabbits and squirrels
- Will eat insects, berries and plants

This property is home to many of God's creatures. Over the years we've seen one bald eagle, deer, rabbits, and many different birds. It is also home to grapevines, rose hips, bittersweet and red twig dogwood.

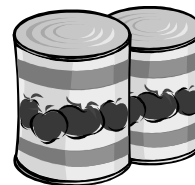
SOUP KITCHEN NEWS

Pastor's Perspective

*Worship Commission Ideas

After asking for and receiving input from the whole parish, the parish pastoral council last year made the decision that we will need to build a new, well-equipped, permanent Activities Center to replace the temporary, small and under-equipped one we are currently using. The Archdiocese and Cardinal Maida gave us the go ahead to enter into phase one of that project—hiring an architect, agreeing on design and costs, and getting approval from the township for an overall master plan. Only when that is in place can we seek permission to begin fund-raising.

One of the key judgments which fed into that decision was the realization that we need such a building more immediately than we need an expanded church. For those who have been in the parish over 10 years you know that there had been a dream at one time of first building a large, new church. That day might come, but not before dealing with the more immediate need for space in which to grow our formation and community outreach programs. But, in making that decision we also looked at the “footprint” that an expanded church would need in the future, if it were to be enlarged, so that we don't encroach on that space when building the Activities Center.

This means that the decision to focus major energy (and eventually major fund-raising) on a new and permanent Activities Center does not mean that we have forgotten about a number of the ideas and concerns that were raised in the goal-setting process concerning the church interior. The Worship Commission took all those ideas and has been exploring how to move forward with those that can be done in the existing church space. The main criteria have been 1) what we do must be able to be transferred to an expanded church, if that were ever to happen; 2) enhance the beauty and overall ability to celebrate liturgy well in the existing church; 3) be funded not with special fund-raising but with existing operating budget funds.

To this end, the budget over the last few years has put aside some monies

for new lighting, a new sound system, some wall designs, painting and floor covering costs as well. In addition, we are exploring a baptismal font that has flowing water, a crucifix at the front of the church, and a more substantial and artistic altar and ambo (where we proclaim the readings).

We have begun to work with a liturgical consultant, Mr. Michael Northrop, to come up with all the design elements we will need, which in turn will help us prioritize the stages and costs of any refurbishing. Nothing has been decided and all must pass through the parish council. But the Worship Commission is excited about what might be possible to do within reasonable costs. Some of those costs are maintenance/upgrade of facilities that are normal over time—lighting, sound, floor covering, painting, and so forth. Others will be associated with specific liturgical design elements—font, altar, ambo, tabernacle area, front sanctuary wall, crucifix.

Interestingly, it was the decision to pursue a crucifix that was at the heart of everything. Not so simple, really, to just get a crucifix. It needs to enhance the shape/style of our church. But then, it needs to have a backdrop that allows that to happen. But then how high up should it be hung and maybe we should lower the sanctuary by one step so that we can make it wheel-chair accessible (I would like to do this sooner than later). But then we should extend the platform toward the tabernacle and raise the tabernacle slightly and do something similar as a backdrop to the tabernacle as we want to do for the backdrop to the crucifix. But then we need to integrate colors of all these and any flooring. But then we need to consider better/more natural light and how to diffuse it into the church. But then... We are still in the process of thinking through all these “but thens” and will come up with a design sketch that allows everyone to consider any changes that will be made.

As mentioned above, it must be able to be done within the yearly operating budget, with no special fund-raising. That will keep the project within reasonable cost limits, but still allow for a significant improvement in the worship

environment. The Worship Commission and Art and Environment Committee will next be meeting with the liturgical consultant on Saturday February 9th to continue the discussion.

*Lent

Ash Wednesday is coming up quickly—February 6th—which means we need to do some thinking in preparation for the Lenten season. How can we enter the spirit of this season—fasting, prayer, more attentive to giving of ourselves for the good of others? What kind of fast would help us mark the season each day, not just once or twice? Can we find a few extra minutes of prayer each day? The best kind of Lenten practices are those that remind us of the spirit of the season each day. That is why fasting from certain foods or meals has always been a core component of Lent. Combined with prayer we become more attentive to the things we need to change in our lives as well as to the ways God is inviting us to change in responding to others. Something daily, if possible. You will be receiving a pre-Lenten mailing next week which lets you know what is happening in the parish the next couple of months. I want to draw your attention especially to the following:

February 1st Coffee House: For adults (teens also welcome):

The success of our Advent Coffee House inspired this one just prior to the start of Lent. A great chance to prepare for the season and enjoy some good coffees/teas to boot!

Fridays of Lent

Along with the Church's focus on Fridays (abstinence from meat) the parish also encourages parish members to make the Fridays of Lent a key component of our Lenten season. On Friday February 8 we will have Mass at 9:00 AM followed by all day adoration in the Church, ending at 7:00 PM with Benediction. Make the sacrifice and try to come for a few minutes, even if at the end of the day, at let the Lord's presence in the Blessed

Sacrament draw you into the spirit of the season. Two of the Fridays will be G.R.A.C.E. Fridays and the other three will be a soup and stations or soup and speaker evening.

***Good Leaders, Good Shepherds Program**

I mentioned that I will be part of a diocesan program for priests called “Good Leaders, Good Shepherds.” The first module will take place this week from Tuesday through Friday at St. John Center in Plymouth. That means I will not be at the parish during those days. Please keep me and the other 25 or so priests in prayer. To prepare for this module each of us was asked to do one of those self-assessment “tests” and ask others—people we work with and/or socialize with—to take it and assess us as well. I’m not a huge fan of those tests, which try to put you into (usually) one of eight categories of personalities. On the other hand it is always interesting to find out what an “objective” test tells you and whether others see you as similar or very different than you see yourself.

***February G.R.A.C.E.: What is the Church’s Understanding of Sin?**

Our next whole community formation week will be February 10-15: What is Sin? This is for everyone in the parish. Adults without children can call the parish and let us know which evening you will be attending (Sunday, Tuesday, Wednesday, or Friday, 6:00 – 8:30 PM). Parents you have or chose a designated evening. If for some reason you cannot make that evening, please call the parish and see if another evening has openings.

Please note: this is not an optional formational program for children. This is a mandatory part of the formation for grades 1-8. A couple of parents asked if their child could be prepared for one of the sacraments without attending the G.R.A.C.E. sessions. No. The archdiocese has a policy of two years of regular catechetical preparation in addition to any specific sacramental preparation, before receiving a sacrament. By

attending few or none of the monthly G.R.A.C.E. sessions you are making a decision not to have your child prepared for a sacrament as well.

But what if a parent cannot attend in the evenings? Then ask a grandparent, aunt, uncle, or godparent. Switch the evening you attend. Adjust other priorities. Please do not send your children with another adult—neighbor or friend—whose children are also attending. We will ask you to come and pick them up. The whole point of the formation model is to recognize that if the key adults, especially parents, are not part of the process, then it makes little sense to focus on the child alone. What they learn at their level needs to be reinforced during the month at home via discussion and use of the material from the take-home packet. For that to work, a parent or, ideally, both parents are asked to be here. Please make your own and your child’s faith formation a top priority in the family life. Besides, it gives adults a chance to interact with other adults on topics of faith. Instead of being a burden, these evenings can be fun.

***Elijah Cup**

I want to commend our Vocations Committee for getting the ball rolling on “Elijah Cup” focus on vocations. Each week a family/household is praying for vocations and reflecting on their own vocation in life. Each week we use the cup as the main chalice at one of the weekend liturgies. If you are interested in being contacted by the Vocations Committee to host the cup during a week, please call the parish office or sign up in the binder in the hallway. We conclude the annual week of prayer for Christian Unity this week. May we never settle for a Church that divides rather than unites. May we as a Church work for the unity of all Christians and the common good of all humanity.
