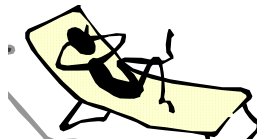

The Elijah Cup

What is it? The Elijah Cup is a chalice that is presented to a family each Sunday after Communion. It comes in a case with a journal that explains its purpose and gives ideas for prayers that can be used to pray for vocations.

What do we do with it? The family takes the Elijah Cup home, places it in a prominent place to remind them to pray daily for vocations. At the end of the week, a family member/s makes a short notation in the journal stating how having the Cup affected them. The Cup is then returned at the following weekend Liturgy, placed on the Offertory table and carried up by family members as part of the Offertory procession.

Note: This same Cup is then used during the Consecration at that Mass.

Since many of us are traveling during these upcoming summer months, we would like to invite you to have your family sign up for this wonderful opportunity choosing the best time for you. The Elijah Cup binder is located on the table in back of the church just beneath the Holy Oils.

...Protecting God's Children Workshop—October 9, 2008

This workshop focuses on creating safe environments for children by preventing the opportunity for sexual abuse to occur. This session will include videos and discussion along with a light meal. ...Perennial Exchange — September 13, 2008

Gardeners, mark your calendars for the 3rd annual Perennial Exchange. Not sure what a perennial exchange is? Here are answers to some frequently asked questions about perennial exchanges.

Q: How much does it cost? NOTHING!

Q: How does it work? Dig and divide any perennials that are overgrown. Put the plant into a container (pot, empty milk jug, or bag) water and label each container. Put the plants in your trunk and be prepared to go home with new and colorful treasures for your garden!

Q: Why should I come? For the health of the plant and to encourage extensive blooming, dividing perennials is the right thing to do. Fall is the preferred time to divide perennials and most perennials should be divided every three to five years. Dividing perennials controls the size of the plant and rejuvenates them, which allows them to become vigorous and bloom freely. Most plants that are brought to our exchange are mature plants that are tried and true winners from neighboring gardens, so this is a great opportunity to try that perennial that you've always wanted for FREE!

Q: When and where is this going to take place? This FREE event starts at 9:30 a.m. and ends at 12 noon on Saturday, September 13, 2008. The exchange will take place at the pavilion, rain or shine.

Volunteers are needed to transport plants from the parking lot to the pavilion. If you need Community Service hours or want to spend a pleasant morning with gardeners, please consider helping at this fun event. Start looking at your garden now to see what's overgrown and where you could make room for new flowers. 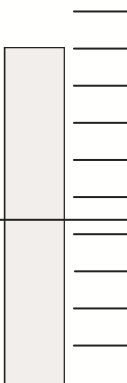

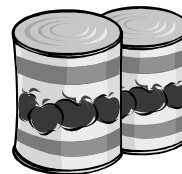
Blood Drive Results

astor's Perspective

*Parish Namesake Day and Picnic

When the feast of SS. Peter and Paul falls on the last Sunday of June, as it does this year, it takes precedence over the usual Sunday or other celebrations and readings. That is why the readings and prayers today are from the feast of Peter and Paul, apostles. But we also want to highlight our namesakes John and Paul on this day, since it is the nearest Sunday to their actual feast of June 26th. So, it gets quite confusing. I can't tell you how many times, when introducing me elsewhere, I am said to be the pastor of SS. Peter and Paul! No, John and Paul, not the apostles by those names, but brothers and martyrs from the 4th century. A brief review of their lives as well as a description of the meaning of their icon on the east wall of the church is posted on our website. A link is provided under the New and Noteworthy items.

More importantly, however, is our community of faith of John and Paul. Come out and play at our parish picnic from 2-6 PM Sunday (today). We will have tents, tables and chairs set up, but bring your own blankets and lawn chairs, if you prefer. A group of the men usually arrange a horseshoe tournament. I've been given a brand new bocce set. I'll bring it and see if anyone wants to organize a bocce game or two.

People, food, song, dance, games—what more can you ask for. See you at the picnic.

*Fourth of July and Civil Religion

I attended a conference last week, sponsored by Detroit Public TV, called "Prayer in America." They had two hour-long videos on the subject, followed by panel discussions and conversation. It was fascinating to hear what constitutes prayer, and what prayer means, from certain representatives of various religious traditions. For some—the Jainist and Buddhist representatives stood out to me—there was no belief in a personal, Creator God and so prayer was not prayer "to" someone but a practice that develops

one's own inner godhead or enlightenment. For others—the Muslim, Jewish and Catholic representatives, for example—prayer not only was "to" someone but had a decided group or communal dimension. We are not just individuals who pray but we are communities of faith (with whole identities) within which we pray both as individuals and groups.

Much of the video clearly was devoted to what is called "civil religion." It is that form of prayer and practices of prayer that most Americans are familiar with at public events. Whether it is a prayer dedicating a new park, a Memorial Day prayer for a city or township, a 9-11-2001 remembrance prayer for a community, a prayer to start governmental meetings, a reference to God by a president or governor, and so on—all such prayers tend toward civil religion. It is a bonding of the civic community not by their religious beliefs but by their commonality as citizens, as Americans. As such, it is prayer that is quite 'watered-down' lest we offend anybody. Usually it invokes God or the Deity and asks for God's blessing or providence to be at work in our nation. It is often very America-centered, as though this nation is the special carrier of God's designs for the world. It presumes a common understanding of "God", even if we don't have such a commonality.

One of the questions in the follow-up time was from a young college student who asked why we don't pray more often together. From her point of view it should be simple to do. Just pray together and then we will be able to live together in peace. Prayer for her was a practice of civic virtue more than an expression of belief or particular way of life. The panel members' answers did not satisfy her, since they tended to agree that it would be a good thing to do, but then pointed out their own traditions understanding of prayer. For one of them prayer can only be individual and personal, never communal. For another, prayer must be Christian, in the name of Jesus, or else it isn't true prayer. For another, prayer is not to a God and so he was uncomfortable with all those civil religion presumptions that we share a common belief in God.

I was reminded of Pope John Paul II's initiative a number of years ago, gathering leaders of various faith communities together in Assisi, Italy, and inviting all of them to spend time in prayer together. Not pray together in a common act or shared words. But spend time in each other's presence, each praying in their own way. It was recognition both of the common human need for and hunger for prayer yet also of the very different ways and meanings of prayer to the participants. In that way it was very different from the civil religion form I describe above. Rather than water down the experience to some shared, minimal commonality, it allowed for the full expression of a tradition's prayer, without offense to others.

That would not be the type of prayer the college student was asking for. But it is a type of prayer together that most respects the situation we are in today. Otherwise, in the name of unity or commonality we or others find core beliefs ignored or set aside. For example, in any civil religious type prayer, by avoiding the Triune nature of God with the intercession of Jesus Christ and the work of the Holy Spirit as one with but different from the Father, such prayer is not fully Christian. It is not anti-Christian, but it tends toward a type of deism that minimizes or omits the core belief of our faith tradition.

Having expressed my cautions above, I don't want to suggest that such civil religious prayer is without merit. Yes, I think it tends to overemphasize the role of America and its freedom as God's providence at work in the world. But it is still an important component of shaping our perception as one nation. It allows, even if only minimally, the experience that maybe we are more than just individuals bound by common laws. We answer to something greater that is not of our own creation. In recent decades these experiences have become more reduced, as people have challenged any public expression of religious faith as a violation of the first Amendment. But we still have enough such experiences that help this nation keep an identity deeper than class, race, ethnicity, and any particular belief.

In the video "Prayer in America" there was a comparison between the response in America, post 9-11-2001 and

in Great Britain post 7-05-2005 (after their bombings). The American way of practicing public, civil religion allowed for a means to express grief, remorse, prayer and hope on behalf of the whole nation and we saw an outpouring of such gatherings with prayer. Whereas in Great Britain, although they also have a practice of civil religion connected to “God and King/Queen” and an official established Anglican faith, as a society over the last decades they have moved away from too much public display of such practices. A moment of silence was observed but far fewer public gatherings with prayer.

We should appreciate the practice of civil religion we do have. But we also recognize that there is much in American society that is not “of God” and that true patriotism is not an unconditional “America right or wrong” but a willingness to be involved in public life, in government, in community groups, in the military and other service avenues for the sake of working to make America a better place.

Please join us for our Friday, July 4th Mass at 9:00 AM. If we sing one of the typical patriotic, hymns notice how the

words are part of that more generic, civil religion language. Sing it robustly but also with a prayer that we recognize our faults and tendencies that are not so providentially of God.

May God bless our nation. May we be unafraid to examine our faults, even as we take leadership to encourage the world to practices of freedom and human dignity.

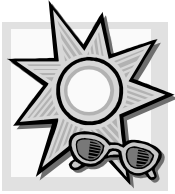
