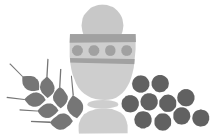

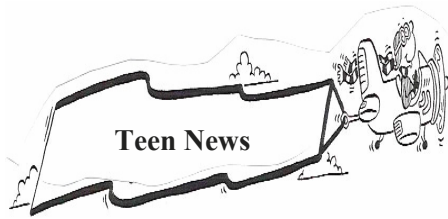

Habitat for Humanity: An Arm of Government?

SS. John & Paul will be partnering with other area churches and Macomb Habitat for Humanity in their "Faith Build" house scheduled to be built this summer. In an effort to clear up some common misconceptions about Habitat, we will be publishing some myths and facts in this bulletin and in the coming weeks.

Myth: *Habitat for Humanity is an arm of the government.*

Fact: Habitat is a Christian housing organization. It is neither an arm of the government nor of any church or denomination. It does not accept government funds for new home construction or for the renovation or repair of existing houses. Habitat does accept government assistance for the acquisition of land or houses in need of rehabilitation. Habitat also accepts government help for streets, utilities and administrative expenses, as long as the funds carry no obligations that would limit Habitat's ability to proclaim its Christian witness. Habitat does not receive United Way funds for building homes, either.

If you have construction skills, or a desire to learn, we welcome you. Work dates will most likely begin in June and be on Wednesdays and Saturdays through October. Watch the bulletin for specific dates when SS. John & Paul volunteers will be needed.

Pastor's Perspective

*Feast of the Ascension

Today we celebrate the feast of the Ascension. In the past it was usually celebrated on a Thursday and thus the name "Ascension Thursday." Most of the bishops of the United States agreed to move the feast to a Sunday so that more people celebrate the feast and reflect on the readings and the meaning of the Ascension. The tying of the feast to a Thursday comes from a reading of Luke's Acts of the Apostles. In that book Luke says that Jesus appeared to the disciples many times during forty days and then ascended into heaven (Acts 1:3-9). Luke then tells the story of the gift of the Holy Spirit coming upon the apostles and other disciples praying in the Upper Room on the feast of Pentecost, which would have been fifty days after Jesus' resurrection. This timeline eventually became part of the Church's liturgical calendar.

Interestingly, both in Luke's gospel and in the gospel of John, the stories of Jesus' resurrection include both the resurrection and ascension on the same day (gospel of Luke) or the resurrection, ascension and sending of the Spirit on the same day (John's gospel). We misread the gospels if we try to read them either as fictional stories (they are not) or as historical narratives of what exactly took place (they are not these either). Instead, the earliest Christians knew that the same Jesus with whom they had walked, listened to, and followed, had truly died and yet they experienced him alive, beyond death, still active in their lives.

In other words, something did happen that was extraordinary and not of their own power. No human imagination on its own made this up. It happened to too many and with too many similarities. Yet, the early Church did not believe the stories had to be taken as literal renditions of what happened. They realized that no simple words could capture the reality of that experience. They knew that there were different experiences, some with different timelines and details, but they embraced all the ones in the four gospels we have as authentic theological descriptions of how to understand what had happened. Jesus

was crucified and died. He was raised beyond death by the Father. He appeared in special ways to a number of disciples. He sent the gift of the Holy Spirit so that through this Spirit we can know the presence of the risen Lord in our own lives as surely as any other reality and act upon it.

But why this focus on the reality of an "ascension"? Once we believe in the resurrection of Jesus, there seems little added by thinking about the ascension. The Church's early creeds include a statement on the ascension to emphasize Jesus' eternal reality—he is at the "right hand of the Father." All authority of God the Father flows through Jesus and is given to Jesus. It is not enough to simply believe Jesus has been raised from the dead, as awesome as that is. Rather, he has been raised for a purpose: to share eternally in the glory of the Father and to lead all creation to that same unity.

Moreover, by focusing on the ascension we are reminded that the resurrection of Jesus is intimately connected to the community of disciples. Yes, Jesus has been raised from the dead. But his risen presence is not going to be experienced in the form of special appearances or miraculous interventions from on high. Rather, wherever and whenever the disciples gather in his name, remember him, proclaim him, and live courageously for the sake of the kingdom of God as he did, there the risen Lord becomes present and active.

In that sense, celebrating the feast of the Ascension separately from the resurrection keeps us from taking for granted the "automatic" presence of the risen Lord. He is risen indeed. But, no, we do not control his presence. He does not come at our beck and call. Rather, when we heed his beck and call and form our lives by his word and actions, there he is in our midst. Now and forever. But for that we need desperately to seek and open ourselves to the gift of the Spirit of God Jesus promises. Only then will we be able to live the life necessary for the Lord's presence. Thus the feast of the Ascension points us forward to the feast of Pentecost. Let us pray for the gift of the Spirit anew in our lives.

*Catholic Services Appeal

Thank you to all who have already responded. You will find a chart of our progress in this year's CSA each subsequent week in the bulletin. I realize finances can be stretched only so far. But do your best. For those who are able, please see the \$300 suggested donation as a minimum. We have been setting aside the extra CSA monies (over and above the mandatory target which goes toward diocesan ministries) these past few years, so that we will be able to tackle some major projects in the next few years: new entranceway and parking lot (with any required upgrading of entrance lanes, drainage ponds and the like); new windows in the Church, better lighting, painting, in addition to some modest but important artistic improvements; if possible the connection to city water. I would like to see us do all of these without any other extra fundraising. Your generous CSA donation/pledge, in addition to your consistent Sunday financial stewardship, makes this possible. Thank you.

*May: Rosary, May Crowning

Our parish Rite of Crowning an Image of the Blessed Virgin ("May Crowning") will take place on **Wednesday, May 14, at 6:30 p.m.** With our new faith formation structure, we no longer have all the children attending a faith formation session on that day and so it will take a decision on the part of families and individuals to participate in this year's May Crowning. I strongly encourage it as a way to connect to a part of our Catholic tradition, to bring our needs and hopes to this time of intercessory prayer and to honor the Blessed Virgin. All are invited. I hope we fill the Church. I offer a special invitation to our first Eucharist children and their families. I would love to have them be part of the prayer and procession, dressed in first Eucharist clothing. In addition, since all of our parish commissions and parish council meet following the May Crowning, I hope most of those members can attend as well.

Remember as well that during the month of May, each Monday 1/2 hour before Mass, we will have a public praying of the rosary. We will take one of the four sets of mysteries each week so that by the

end of the month all 20 mysteries have been prayed.

***Parish Council**

We will be selecting four new members to our parish pastoral council, to replace four outgoing ones. The names, a picture and a brief bio of the nominees will be in next week's bulletin. Please pray for them, for the council and for the parish as we prepare to draw four names through a selection process.

We use a selection process rather than an election in order to diminish the political overtones the word "parish council" sometimes connotes. The parish council is not like city councils or councils of lodges and the like. Rather they are an advisory group and a visioning committee. Through their attentiveness to what is happening in the parish, their own prayer and reflection, their dialogue with one another and with me as pastor, they help promote a vision for the parish and help guide decisions that affect the life of the parish.

Each year they review the budget and offer recommendations on the overall direction of the budget. They meet three times a year with different commissions as well as meeting on their own several times a year. They take responsibility for recognizing and encouraging volunteer ministries throughout the parish. In the past few years they led the parish through a goal setting process.

Please pray that the council can have the experience, the diversity and the energy to be an excellent advisory and visioning group for the parish.

***Teaching Masses**

I want to give everyone a head's up that all the Masses on the **weekend of May 24/25** will be celebrated as "Teaching Masses." It has been my custom to preside at all the Masses on the feast of Corpus Christi and to allow them to intentionally focus on some aspects of our participation and understanding at Mass. It adds about 5 minutes to the length of the Mass, but most find these helpful reminders about how we are intended to enter into full, conscious and active participation in the Sunday

Eucharist. A good preparation for these Masses is to read my short pamphlet "Our Sunday Eucharist." There is a link to it online at our www.ssjohndandpaul.org website.

***175th Anniversary of the Archdiocese of Detroit**

On May 18 the archdiocese will celebrate a 175 anniversary Mass at Blessed Sacrament Cathedral at 3:00 p.m. It is open to all, so come early, since it is likely to be crowded. In particular, says Cardinal Maida, "I ask that you invite those who have recently celebrated the reception of First Communion or who were recently baptized at the Easter Vigil to come to this celebration dressed in their festive attire." So, consider yourself invited. If you need directions, let me know.

***Holy Hour for Vocations**

On the evening of May 18th there will be a holy hour for vocations at St. Lawrence in Utica at 7:00 p.m. This is designated specifically as a holy hour for an increase to vocations to the priesthood and consecrated life. St. Lawrence will be using a monstrance blessed by the late Pope John Paul II during the 2004 Year of the Eucharist. They invite all in the vicariate to be part of this prayer or to take time during the night to come to the church and pray. Eucharistic adoration will continue from 8:00 p.m. in the evening to 3:00 p.m. on Monday.

***G.R.A.C.E.**

Our final G.R.A.C.E. sessions for the year take place this week. The theme of "Prayer: Keeping the Fires Burning" ties into our preparation for Pentecost. Come to one of the sessions this week and use the week to reflect on the patterns of prayer that are present in your life. Pray for the outpouring of the Spirit on yourself, your family, this parish. May we be a parish of great energy and faith, formed in the likeness of Christ by the Spirit, so that the presence of the risen Lord breaks through again and again into our lives and, through us, into the lives of those we touch.
